Patronal Feast of St Margaret of Scotland Sunday 17th November 2019



This Sunday the Parish celebrates its Patron Saint, St Margaret of Scotland (1045 -1093) one of the largely unknown saints of the Middle Ages and someone of whom I knew nothing before coming to this parish. St Margaret lived at the heart of Anglo-Saxon and Scottish political establishment, and like today not the obvious place for sanctity yet she joins Edward the Confessor, St Osmund of Old Sarum as one of the three great saints of those troubled times.

The Church recognises her as a saint whose consistent spiritual acts of charity revealed her inner holiness. St Margaret lived in times different to our own, and lived a life circumscribed by the minutiae of court life. This life though, of repeated exile and homecoming, is not dissimilar to that of many migrants today. She must have seen her experiences not in terms of victimhood but as part of the unfolding providence of God to which she connected in prayer. St Margaret made use of the circumstances of her own family to pursue her religious life of prayer and almsgiving.

St Margaret along with St Edward, St Osmund and St Thomas More provide encouraging examples of what is possible in public life. The complexity of public life has greatly increased since then and the domain of government has extended over much of human activity but the foundation of the moral life remains the same, to seek good and avoid evil remains. The increasing complexity and extended reach of government has magnified the consequences of political choices, consequences unforeseen at the time of decision. A recent suggestion coming from the current election is to reduce the working week to four days and has immediately rung alarm bells in the NHS about funding is just one example such of un-thought through consequences. The examples could be multiplied of seeing political activity in terms of cause and effect alone, of a managerial understanding of human society, of the preponderance of experts advising in their limited field. In terms of their chosen area of expertise they might know more than the ordinary person but when it comes to a proposed vision of society, they can claim no advantage.

St Margaret and her saintly companions were not experts on processes, or agents of a society dominated by managerial cause and effect. They lived under a higher power, God, who would, through His Son, establish His kingdom in due time. The earthly kingdom was a very imperfect prototype of the heavenly kingdom but whose earthly conduct mirrored the commands of the Gospel. Obviously, there was probably as much sin, violence, greed and veniality as today, but the ever-present reality of divine judgement must have placed a fitful brake on possible action. This might seem incredulous to the modern mind that religion reduces violence but the examples of the revolutions in Russia, China and Cambodia where God's existence was expressly denied, points otherwise.

The decline in coherent and systematic religious belief has taken away something not thought through when the cry went up to keep religion out of politics. Religion offered a coherent big picture of human flourishing which was not something one could pin down in a series of statements or attainment targets. The bigger picture gave the sense of direction and an underlying purpose to our society. Obviously that sense of direction differed in detail between political parties, but for anv democracy to work an underlying unity beneath the differences needs to hold. This used to be provided in England by the Church of England, in Wales by Non-conformity, and Scotland by the Episcopalian Church. These churches were broad enough in belief as to content of faith but which all accepted the Ten Commandments as the structure for moral life.

This election has demonstrated the baleful effects of this gap. None of the party leaders claim any religious affiliation and are beholden to abstract notions such as freedom, the collective or process. Once such ideas are detached from the person, they lose their anchor and are devoid of real meaning. This makes voting a difficult task because there is no obvious home for the 'Christian' vote. One must try one's best to discern in each political party amongst the claims and counterclaims which party would prove least damaging to the weakest members of our society, provide opportunity for the children and young people of this country and sustain an economy that would benefit all people.

Our task though, like that of St Margaret, goes beyond this minimum. Like our patron we should allow the practice of faith to develop a deeper charitable vocation towards others, both to those in obvious need and to sustain our parish as a 'cell of good living', a living microcosm that reflect something of the beauty of the kingdom of heaven to which we are all called.
