Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe (c)

24th November 2019

Fr Peter writes:

This weekend the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Christ the King that concludes the Church's liturgical year. It might well seem in this democratic age that the celebration of kingship sounds anachronistic and that the Church should be celebrating something more up to date such as 'people power' instead. The Kingship of Christ is not the celebration of power but of divine love which is all powerful but one that is never imposed but only offered on this earth

The Gospel reading demonstrates this point clearly. Jesus was crucified between two thieves and their shared conversation pin points the loving power of Jesus. Both wish to escape their predicament, one demands immediate earthly salvation, of coming down from the Cross and continuing with his earthly life, maybe reformed or not, while the other wishes simply to be remembered when Jesus enters His kingdom. The latter's wish is granted, and he does share in this divine rescue, and enters into paradise. He demonstrates that the fear of God is not terror but the inner acceptance of God's power to save.

The world of power looks to have vanquished the world of love in the death of Jesus on the Cross but the Resurrection points the other way. Love has triumphed over the world of death. The drama of the Cross is the one moment on Calvary which extends over all creation and the Cross therefore becomes the point of judgement on the world. The Cross judges the forces of evil and of death.

The Crucifixion is the foundation of Christ's kingship because it turns around the sign of weakness into a sign of strength, and the gateway to eternal life. The Cross is both the symbol of God's power but also the perennial question mark over human conduct, both individually and collectively. The reality of the Cross makes visible the limits of human power, both in its ability to save humanity and in the extent of its reach. The political system of any country must ensure a shared order between people, provide security for its citizens and the space within which to live family life. No political system can promise salvation yet listening to recent manifesto pledges for this election one would be hard-pressed not to accept that salvation can be found through political action. The staggering amounts of money pledged by different political parties all demand the same question as to the source of this largesse. Overinflated claims always bring disappointment, and erode the respect owed to those who govern since the promises are never completed.

More subtly the Cross raises questions about the legitimacy of moral

action The Cross is the visible voice of conscience. both belief. Jesus died for all victims whether the unborn, the terminally ill, the migrant, the victims of abuse, the homeless, indeed all those on the margin. The fact that Jesus died for all these, makes them the legitimate heirs of His kingdom. Next month's General Election, raises the question as to how the different parties aim to engage with these groups. Their proposed treatment becomes the litmus test for the Christian vote. There is no one obvious political party for the Catholic vote since each party contains policies both antithetical and favourable to the Christian faith. It is more a matter of tone rather than detail. Does each party recognise the line between public concern and family or private life? How much should any government meddle in the education of children, legislate on lifestyle, or impose thought patterns onto the mind.

On the Easter Vigil the priest inserts the grains of incense into the Paschal Candle with the words, 'by these glorious wounds....' The Cross brings peace to the world by breaking down the barrier between God and humanity, and therefore the Christian has something to bring to public life, the care for the victim and the means for peace. Every Christian has a duty to 'the least of the brothers and sisters of mine'. The message of the Good Thief to Jesus is our message too: 'Remember me when you come into your kingdom'. Jesus has remembered us, and we, through the Church, are in that kingdom, and so we too can offer the same message of hope to others in the name of Christ.
