5th SUNDAY OF EASTER - 2nd May 2021 Year B

In Peter writes: One point that often strikes me when reading about the saints of the Church is their constant search for forgiveness and the sense of their sinfulness. At first sight it, would not the opposite would be the case. They are saints, more holy than ourselves, and surely their need for forgiveness consequently less. Yet reading St Augustine's Confessions or St Teresa of Avila's life by herself, their minutely and keenly observed personal reflection pinpointed the entry of sin into their lives. Augustine wanted to be like the other boys so stole the pears from the orchard, a trivial incident that bore him down, likewise St Teresa read novels as a young woman in imitation of her mother, but unlike her mother gave up on her life of prayer.

Both saints discover what the Psalmist wrote three thousand years ago, 'Lord, free me from my unknown faults'. How, one might ask could they or us be guilty if one's conscience was clear at the time. Age and the passage of time demonstrate that though our conscience at the time was untroubled, it had also yet to be formed. Being able to reflect backwards into childhood is always bitter-sweet experience, the original innocence has disappeared but also that a developed conscience accepts that adult sensibilities cannot be retrospectively applied unilaterally to one's own or anyone else's childhood.

Charles Ryder, the chief protagonist of Evelyn Waugh's Brideshead Revisited, does not lament the 'cocksure certainties of his youth', and compared his moral development to the production of port that takes years to mellow to its naturally rich flavour having begun as a bitter liquid. Conscience seen in this developmental way cannot be divorced from the search for truth and goodness. Thus, if you hear yourself saying all too easily, 'my conscience is clear'. This may well be the case but very subtly it may be just an excuse for a convenient stop on the path towards goodness. Life may be characterised as a series of compromises but to see them as inevitable is to begin to let iron into the soul. They are compromises and bring with them both individual

and social consequences. The recent populist movements of Black Lives Matter, Me Too and Everyone's Included have identified the social consequences of collective blindness. I doubt the list will end here. These movements bring other ideological baggage with them, but their originating sentiments touch this collective blindness and lack of formation of conscience.

This Sunday's Gospel of the vine offers an alternative viewpoint. The Christian disciple is a pilgrim whose conscience is in a process of constant formation through engagement in his or her faith, the full life of the Church, it sacramental, teaching and community roles. The vinedresser, God the Father, prunes the branches, makes us sit up and recognise the need for change both in myself and in the world. Seeing a vine ladened with fruit is such a beautiful image of the possibilities of human life, that it makes the statement, 'basically I am a good person' seem rather small minded in comparison. Not because one might not be. This is not a judgement on the moral qualities on those who use such expressions, but rather to question the measure. Is our limited humanity a better scale to use rather than the superabundance of God's grace and mercy?

The Christian religion does not start with a moral code but a living relationship with Jesus Christ. Our dynamic relationship with Jesus within His community, the Church, will make us see that sanctity, the really good life is the goal of faith. Grace keeps our eyes open and makes sure that any attempts at self-justification should be taken very with caution. The Church is inviting us to a greater vision. Recent events demonstrate that this might not be a bad idea and would indeed bring authentic cultural change.

Refurbishment of the Parish Hall, Facilities and Basement

May I write to impart the good news that the building work has been given permission to proceed by the Finance Office of the Diocese. The builders will arrive on **Monday May 10th** and with a fair wind conclude on **Friday September 3rd**.

Please note the following changes for the construction period.

The Hall, lavatories and basement will be out of action and inaccessible. Facilities will be provided on the Presbytery ground floor for the four months. The carpark will also be partially occupied by the builders. Weekday parking will be difficult and Sunday parking restricted. My hope is that these temporary inconveniences will be outweighed by the emergence of a restored hall, enlarged kitchen and better facilities in September. Please may I ask for your patience during this period.

This is also the moment to thank once again all those who have contributed to the building fund which has reached nearly £130,000 donated and pledged. The financing of the project is divided into the three parts, the fundraising campaign, the partial use of the cash balance in the bank and a loan from the Diocese of £125,000 payable over seven years. The loan will be paid back through additional Hall rentals, some fundraising and regular donations from the existing building fund.



We have raised an *amazing £4500/-* via donations for Richmond Furniture Scheme to procure starter packs of essential home items for those being re-housed or moving into accommodation for the first time.

Thank you for your generosity and for helping us raise this fantastic amount.
