#### 14th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 3 JULY 2022 - Year C

In Peter writes: Philip Pullman, echoing the sentiments of many, creates a

chasm between the Jesus of history and the Christ of faith. As the Jesus of history has been obscured by two thousand years of Christ, his teaching is luckily opaque and lacking in detail. Detail and authority are products of the Church, in this mind-set and not of Jesus Christ. Unbeknown to them, their thinking is the product of the late 18th Enlightenment and 19th century scientific revolution. Thinkers and biblical critics rejected any adherence to tradition and to the literal truth of the Bible. What was discussed in the Universities and salons of Europe throughout the 19th century became the common place of the 20th and now 21st century. These sentiments are difficult to dislodge because they tie in with a self-referential system of thinking, that knows the answers before the questions are asked, and which lazily prefers general moral maxims than individual moral precepts. The first denies real wonder about the world, myself and my circle, the second any real sense of moral conversion.

Over throwing family and cultural traditions and responsibilities becomes normal, indeed almost necessary. Universities have become places for unmasking the hidden pattern of power, today gender or race, rather than wealth and psyche. Now students leave with £50,000 debt, being able to wax lyrically about perceived injustices and little about the subject they studied. This is not solely their fault because institutions have lost confidence in the narrative traditions of European learning from the ancient Greeks to the Modern movement, from Homer to Elliott, and feel the constant need to respond to every criticism about their conduct, their courses, their funding, their prejudices, their marking, whether merited or not. The Churches find themselves in the same position forever having to respond to crises, constantly apologising on others' terms, many of whom have little interest in seeking reconciliation. Apology should be made to those effected but that is best done in private and in person, not in public and generically.

This process of decline is not inevitable and Sunday's Gospel demonstrates why. Jesus appoints seventy-two disciples and sends them out on the same mission He himself was undertaking. This detail is fundamental as there is no difference between the mission of the historic Jesus and the continuing mission of the church of which we are the contemporary members. Jesus gives them power to preach and to heal, His own activities. After the mission He commends their success demonstrating the continuity of purpose between Him and His disciples.

The collective body of seventy-two disciples share in the power of Jesus, and working in pairs reinforces the fact that His power is not their personal possession alone. The power to speak of Jesus, and to offer His healing, is a shared enterprise animated by Jesus and is the nascent Church within the life of the Jesus. The community of the Apostles embraces temporarily an association of seventy-two disciples and this mass mission is turned into a visible society when the Holy Spirit descends upon the Apostles at Pentecost.

There is no break between the Jesus of history and the Christ of faith because the historic figure Jesus already had in mind the society He would establish to be animated by the same power as Himself. Every age of the Church is therefore sustained by the originating word of Jesus Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit, and so develops a tradition of understanding and practice. We see the same in our families, the background influence of grandparents and even great-grandparents, in our parishes, the animating influence of former Parish Priests. The Church is similar to school and university is a tradition-based organisation forever being fed from its founder and his mission.

It is easy to think that the world is an unprepossessing place for the advancement of the Gospel. Modern culture feels even less inviting than Galilee and Judaea of two thousand years ago. Yet the disciples were told that will find those predisposed to hear. The same is true today, modern culture is not a hermetically sealed nonreligious society. Some people do have questions; peace remains elusive for the non-religious and religious alike, understanding in front of suffering needs reflection and explanation even if none can be found. Peoples' questions do not always come quickly, they only emerge as confidence builds in the Christians, whether individuals or communities they encounter.

A truly welcoming community should have the ability to gather, to keep together, to listen and to explain. All four facets make a proper welcoming Christian community, charged, as seen in the Gospel, with the power of Jesus Christ. There already exist those who want to hear the saving message of the Gospel.








#### **Richmond Sunday lunch scheme**
