National Holocaust Memorial Day when 7 Peter writes: we were asked to remember the tragic events that led to the murder of six mil-

lion Jews during the Second World War. The last scattering of survivors is now passing into history, and though the events of middle of the 20th century has been the background of anyone over 50 years old life, those younger might not feel the same about events that took place long before they were born. There have been many acts of group killing, brutal in their intensity, since the Second World War especially in Cambodia, Rwanda, Gaza and Israel, but they all lack the industrialisation of death that marked the Holocaust.

Christian history has been marked by periodic bouts of anti-Semitism, expulsions from England, Spain and other European countries. Religion here being used as the cloak around envy at perceived economic success, different racial profile and their perceived role in the death of Jesus. The Holocaust was on a different scale utilising the bureaucratic instruments and post-Christian ideology about the role of the state. Pagan cults centred around the role of the nation, brut nature and the people, the triad that replaced the Churches as worldwide, multinational and humane institutions. Yet what made the Holocaust become possible was the public acceptance fifteen years earlier of a victim political ideology in the economic depression of the 1920s along with the passive acceptive of latent anti-Semitism as being normal.

When I visited Auschwitz many years ago I could hardly comprehend, gazing upon the four demolished gas ovens what had brought European culture to this point. How could the land of Goethe and Beethoven descend to this barbarity? The landscape of the brick piers of the former huts in serried ranks stretching out in different directions, the railway marshalling yards, the workshops and old barracks combined to make the place look like a disused 19th century industrial complex overtaken by technological advance. This deceptively calm landscape was the landscape of death and the local museum testified to the human suffering. A number of the rooms contained large glass boxes filled with spectacles taken by the guards on arrival along with small travelling cases and other personal mementos, material signs of life and hope, cruelly brought to a barbaric end. Here were the signs of humanity sacrificed and it made a poignant contrast to the inhumanity of the enterprise.

No-one will ever know quite why this tragedy was allowed to unfold in all its details. There are obvious culprits in the Nazi Party, and those who actively subscribed to its ideology. Yet what of the thousands involved, each in some small way, in this process of human destruction, those who passively subscribed to Hitler's message of national renewal, those prejudices blinded them to the suffering involved, and those who cared not to listen.

The antidote to this or similar happening again is never going to be provided by legislation alone, but only through the conversion of minds and hearts, that we may see the pain of the world, and actively participate in constructing and maintaining a civilised society. This is becoming increasingly difficult, not simply because of the threat of resurgent totalitarianism but more because western culture has become unable to make collective moral judgements about right and wrong. Pope Francis described the role of education as the place to learn the grammar of dialogue. Grammar is the shared resource for anyone speaking the same language and vital for communication. Western culture is finding this process difficult, assertion whether on internet platforms, in the media or even from ourselves has taken over from reason. Recent events here and in the US demonstrate the difficulty in finding the 'grammar of dialogue' and thus establishing common ground with others.

Here the Church has a unique role. At the heart of faith is the recognition that Jesus Christ reveals men and women to themselves, both as their Saviour and as role model. This Sunday's Gospel records the healing of Peter's mother-in-law, who promptly starts serving Jesus and His disciples but also how Jesus left early to pray alone with the disciples frantically looking for him. Peter's mother-in-law was not conforming to social stereotype but giving her response to healing grace, the same response that each of us should give too. Such service becomes the glue that unites people together despite their differences, yet to do so effectively requires seeing the Gospel message as not simply validating but questioning our service. Foolishly the disciples were keen to capture Him for their town alone, yet that would both deprive others of hearing His saving message and also prevent the disciples for stepping up to preach the Gospel themselves. Jesus leaving for the next town was essential for the Gospel to take root through the faith and service of His believers left behind. The community that is the Church then becomes the repository of true humanity marked by faith in a higher power, healing from above and service to others. Christians are invited to exhibit chid-like faith but act in redeemed adult ways.

Fostering this humane culture of healing and service within the Church is the best defence against totalitarian regimes around the world because they would have no traction as their ideology would not be seen as a cure for their personal malaise, psychological, social and economic.


