In Peter writes: How can you hear the same story with fresh ears? This is a question

for our times. Never has there been so much information but so little wisdom. Information overload has been a theme of many commentators since the 1960s, though I doubt that these pioneers had much conception of the quantities of information available today through the internet. How to make connections between pieces of information is fundamental because building blocks of knowledge become manageable. Over the last year we have become used to random pieces of information being used as battering rams but which lack any connection with anything else. This might be to do with infection rates, climate change, defunding the police, levels of poverty, homophobia, islamophobia etc. All these issues are worthy of attention but none exist in a vacuum. When these issues are seen in isolation it becomes easy to distinguish between those on message and those off message. Thus, failing to jump on the vocal bandwagon hides some guilty secret. This type of analysis is profoundly unhelpful because it pits what might be described as the Pharisees of woke and does little to either advance the causes mentioned above nor to change mindsets.

This either/or, on/off message breeds a contempt for understanding complexity, and fosters a culture of suspicion with regard to commonly accepted viewpoints on every aspect of life. No human society is perfect but may develop with the deepening of conscience as to the nature of good and evil. To view all political or ecclesiastical authority with suspicion is destructive when taken beyond the natural caution that should be expressed in relation to the claims of those in authority.

This Sunday's Gospel demonstrates clearly the dangers of the culture of suspicion which latches onto some known fact and spins the wrong and misleading interpretation. Jesus has returned to His home town, and the town's people know who He is. Paradoxically they call Him Joseph's son rather than Mary's son. Their half knowledge blinds them to Jesus' mission. What they lacked is the ability to questioning the intention of their own questioning, they failed to grasp their own antagonism. They gave the answer before they asked the question, allowing them to confirm their prejudgment as to Jesus' identity.

This inability to question the motivations of one's own questions lies at the heart of the agnosticism of

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the contemporary world. The ancient writers called this 'world-weariness', a profound lethargy in front of life, and which in the Christian tradition became one of the seven deadly sins, acedia, or sloth. Many years ago, Robertson Davies, a great Canadian novelist, gave an end of year talk at a girls' school saying that he thought acedia was the greatest sin. Catholic tradition thinks that place is held by pride, but the author was touching a reality all face who benefit from the plenty of middle-class life. Acedia is found in those who are unable to feel, those who have lost the power of empathy. The opposite is not required either, the modern obsession with offering intimate feelings on an internet platform and identifying personal struggles to the great unknown mass of internet surfers. There is a middle ground that is both empathetic and communicative which is the Christian way.

Sixteen months after the beginning of the first lockdown has created the perfect environment for the creation of acedia. The fear of catching Covid is a legitimate concern and thus preventative action entirely appropriate but when the fear takes on disproportionate levels something else is at work. Every situation requires the infusion of hope both spiritual and human. The townspeople displayed neither, grudging in their assessment of Jesus and His powers. Nazareth must have been a gloomy place, I imagine, a place of unfulfilled longings and pagan fatalism. Our society is heading in the same direction. Hope is now in short supply. Even the longed-for liberation owing to the vaccination programme now seems rather more illusory, travel into mainland Europe becoming more difficult by the day. There must be another place to find the hope that sloth has so clearly hidden. This hope is found in the person of Jesus who wishes to educate us in seeing and hearing, to glimpse at life's ultimate meaning and restoring us to health through His mission of mercy. Thus, we may begin to see with redeemed eyes both the vision and pain of life held together through Jesus who both died and rose to new life.
