5th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 5 February 2023- Year A

In Peter writes:

Last week I spent an enjoyable time reading a book about the religious setting of the Mass during the first centuries of the Catholic Church. I was and was surprised to read that these early Christians did not always meet in a believer's house but were more likely to meet in a shop, workshop or even factory. Recent archaeological evidence is pointing in a different direction and confirms what was thought extra-ordinary that St Paul along with Prisca and Aquila met in their family workshop for the celebration of Mass and the communal meal. Why does it matter that they met in a workshop rather than a house large enough to hold the little congregation?

A number of reasons come to mind, firstly the church community in Corinth and elsewhere was established in an urban environment with multiple people, tradesmen and the poor with the occasional wealthy or powerful member. The Church was never simply a pristine, family or domestic society. This rose-tinted view of the earliest years was made to stand in contrast to what happened when the Emperor Constantine converted to Christianity making it the official religion of the Empire. The personal and intimate morphed to cold and institutional. Such a view was idolised in the years after the Second Vatican Council by activists who sought to return the Church back to the sunny uplands of her earliest years, a project that would remained beyond grasp. By presenting the first centuries as pristine, every subsequent age would feel in the expression of William Shakespeare, 'out of joint.'

Christianity has never been a pristine religion. It is an urban religion originally practiced in houses, factories and workshops located in towns and cities throughout the Roman Empire and beyond. More often liturgical celebrations took place in these inauspicious circumstances in the teeming building complexes that made up ancient cities. These towns and cities were populated with peoples from everywhere, what would be described today as multi-national societies. Something of the international flavour can be seen in the accounts of Pentecost and the letters of St Paul. Urban environments are much less obviously connected with the cycle of the seasons, time is experienced as linear heading forward rather than just the cyclical time and fertility cults of the country. Urban environments are places of struggle, success and resistance with regard to life. Cities sustain associations that extend beyond the nuclear family. They become melting-pots of peoples.

This is the rich soil in which the Gospel was preached, and the images given by Jesus of the Church as provid-

ing the flavour of salt and of being a city built on a hill sustain the role of the Church in the city. Seeing the Church in this way, a multi-national urban visible and spiritual society gives solid foundation to contest many of the more outlandish claims of those who promote Equality, Diversity, and Inclusion, LGGQTI+ or Black Lives Matter to detriment of everything else. These groups start, probably unconsciously, from the modern secular premise of the individual as the fundamental building block of society rather than the person, the individual in relation. The person, to the Christian, is always in relation predisposed to sharing life with others while the individual needs to be cajoled to interact with others who do not share social or economic ties. An attitude of antagonism pervades all these identity groups because, like the mystery religions of the past, regard themselves as the sole purveyors of revealed truths.

Instead, the Christian recognising that the city, shared with others, is something to be built, never complete at any one moment in history. The life of the city, both collectively and individually, requires constant spiritual and moral renewal. Recognising that existing personal and collective relationships need constant renewal is part of faith. Accepting the dynamic of conversion demonstrates that the attempts to legislate about these issues always starts in the wrong place.

Because of the erroneous understanding of the human person, there is no connection with the past, nor appreciation of the conversion stories of every culture, stories of those who stood up and contributed to forming the culture of the time. Whatever the lacunae of this country's past history, conscience is never fully eradicated. To think that it was, except for the illuminati of these modern alliances that populate every organisation, is deny the power of God, the gift of grace, the reality of conversion, the prior relationship between peoples. They cast the city into darkness, so the mission of the Church, to protect the person, becomes as it ever was the light on the hill top and the salt that gives flavour.
