#### **31st SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME** - 5th November 2023 - Year A

## In Peter writes:

This Sunday afternoon the annual blessing of the graves of former parishioners at both Twickenham and Teddington Cemetery will take place. Both cemeteries are peaceful spots, quintessential English environments where the rustle of leaves, the air of quiet contemplation and repose after the busyness of the world are tangibly present. The deceased lie together in grave that make patterns of terraced streets, private estates and occasional cul-de-sacs, all in unconscious imitation of the urban layout of the living. Such close mimicking can only be explained by the difficulty of thinking beyond the bounds of common sense as to the appropriate way of placing the deceased. Italians, on the contrary, organise their dead in imitation hill-top villages with everyone sitting on top of each other within defined city walls of the cemetery.

By the practice of such care, the question as to the possibility of post-death survival is still open even if its quality remains profoundly mysterious. A completely secular society would never bother with such effort. Indeed, the secular agenda has been shrunk down to irony, as the only form of release from questions of immortality and what that might entail. Lauding the inability to take anything seriously might be a contemporary trait but it does not serve well. Funerals in pubs, scattering ashes on a football pitch, or such like are, in the light of these deepest questions, abnegating responsibility in front of traditional common practice. These public acts of irony invite others to participate thus forcing other to engage in a ritual contradiction where irony has become ritualised.

Certainly, stepping from the shadowy understandings of the afterlife to a more structured glimpse of the mystery of postdeath life requires the gift of faith. Every believer recognises both the personal and communal aspects of eternal life, ourselves and the wider church. Wedged between the two, somewhat uncomfortably, are our families, practicing and nonpracticing alike, plus countless others currently unknown.

Everyone who is to be saved is saved through Jesus Christ. Most die not ready to see God face to face, a fact recognised in the liturgy of the church which distinguishes between All Saints and All Souls. Praying for the dead is one of the spiritual acts of mercy, and for a long time praying for the forgotten souls was a common spiritual practice. The Reformers had rejected the Catholic Church's teaching on Purgatory as being unscriptural, because it took it source, the Book of Maccabees, written the language of the time, Aramaic. This book of the Old Testament, recounts the conflict between the Jews and their Greek overlords. At one battle, the Jewish soldiers make a sin offering in the Temple for those soldiers who died in combat but who were found to have pagan amulets hanging around their necks. Their immortal souls were thus sullied and needed the prayers of the living in order to be purified before seeing God face to face.

Thus, praying for the dead became a standard spiritual practice in Jewish and Christian culture because everyone was thought, except the Saints, to have died needing the prayers of the living. Beyond death, the choice for or against Jesus Christ and His Church is not understandable and therefore conversion after death impossible. There can be no post-death change of heart. Purgatory is therefore a passive place for the deceased who rely on the actions of others, Jesus Christ and His Church, both for the mercy and for the prayers.

Today most Catholics have little understanding of Purgatory but this brings its own psychological implications. Peace becomes difficult to find, unless one can actively engage in purifying one's own memory of the deceased that combines both love and reconciliation since no relationship or friendship is perfect in this life. Rejecting Purgatory is tantamount to accepting unfinished business as being the only possible outcome for our relationship with the deceased.

The Catholic faith is not proved by psychological wellbeing, but finding peace through prayer, through offering of Mass and other spiritual practices in relation to the dead, does offer a mark of credibility. Thus, to pray for the deceased in the month of November recognises all salvation comes from Jesus Christ, that life on this earth is transient and that reconciliation with the deceased through our prayers and grace of Christ benefits them and ourselves simultaneously.

Eternal rest grant to them O Lord, and perpetual shine upon them. May they rest in peace.
