5th SUNDAY OF EASTER - 7 May 2023- Year A

In Peter writes:

Last Monday saw the annual Alpha Conference return to the Albert Hall after a lapse of three years owing to Covid and its aftermath. Testimony and 'faith and worship' music marks the shared activities of the morning. After lunch the delegates split into groups and I attended one on 'the city and the church'. This is a theme close to my heart because today's city mirrors in a much greater scale that of the city of Jerusalem at the time of Pentecost and early Church, an amalgamation of many nations all speaking different languages, each coming to the same city with their own culture of origin. Yet out of this cultural meltingpot emerged the one Catholic Church.

Two presenters gave an account of their evangelical activities in today's city, the first explained what, 'Love Singapore' was attempting to achieve by gradually building up a prayer room in every tower block within the cit;, the second about establishing a youth church in a forgotten housing estate in Blackburn, a depressed town in Lancshire. Her testimony about giving hope to the teenage children of drug addicts, to the victims of every form of abuse was inspirational. She explained it was her calling to be present to them in this way. She gave the impression that her methods of engagement mystified the council on both the spiritual and secular plane. Both groups, in contrasting social situations, were bringing Jesus Christ to the city. Sharing practices between the delegates demonstrated that the theme of the conference, 'Look up the harvest is ready' was not just elsewhere but everywhere. None of the projects were large scale but their number spoke of a church already alive at the base in the city.

These conferences always possess a feel-good factor, of like-minded delegates gathered together and keen to fan the flames of faith and build the kingdom of God. They are necessary spiritual tonic and counterblast when it can often seem to those in the field of the world, as if churches like pubs are declining, dying out and being sold. It might be better to think that the Church is changing its public face, of becoming more mission focused rather than just absorbed with the maintenance of past ways of conducting her life. Many people have a romantic attachment to their local pub but if they never enter the front door to buy a drink, economic forces will dictate closure. The same is not quite true of the Church but the belief that somehow the ancient timetables will be perpetuated in aspic, whether it be Mass times, annual sacramental

programmes designed for consumers, or the traditional round of social events, along with all the costs attached, is sadly off the mark. There is no longer the priests, religious and sisters to keep such timetables afloat.

However, there is plenty of untapped spiritual energy in the city, of potential converts to Jesus Christ and His Church, of re-evangelising those who have disappeared for one reason or another. The execution is just going to be different. This Sunday's Gospel describes the many rooms in my Father's House, both the image of the City of God, heaven, but also of the City of humanity, transient and changeable as is its nature. The Church has a place for potentially everybody, no-one is excluded by divine design in anticipation. There are many rooms, the invitation is always open, extended to all but always an offer that requires a conscious and informed response.

The 'many rooms' of the Father's house find their organisational key, their spiritual floor-plan, in the person of Jesus Christ. As Jesus says to Philip, 'to have seen me is to have seen the Father.' Therefore the 'many rooms' found in Jesus Christ, become His body, the Church, an imperfect but visible image of God. It would only be a short stretch of the imagination to see the 'many rooms' as the different Parishes, communities and groups that make up the Body of Christ. Our room of St Margarets fits into this bigger building, the Diocese of Westminster, and within that the largest building, the universal Church, itself an imperfect foretaste of the City of God.

What sort of 'room' does our Parish project to the human city, and how does it both reflect the Body of Christ, and City of God in its life of worship, catechesis, social outreach and community? This is a question that can never definitively answered in history but always needs to be asked. By asking the question and listening to the answers in prayer and conversation is to recognise the call of the Holy Spirit, and so becomes the best way of maintaining a proper focus on the mission of this parish and the Church.




