I still remember, for obvious reasons, the first time I told my mother about wanting to

become a priest. I was twelve and had gone to have lunch where my mother worked near the British Museum. I shocked both her and myself too! The words came out without thinking, from nowhere it seemed. Teenage years past, O levels and A levels, then University. I was too busy doing other stuff to think much about the longer-term future, though the thought of being a priest did occasionally burst into this flow of things to do. Six months in Rome as an intern in an architect's office and meeting seminary students amongst the ex-pats occupying the seats of the then only Irish Bar in Rome (The Fiddlers Elbow – still going) must have rubbed off in some mysterious way.

What struck me now as it did then in Rome both in the 1970s, and then later as a seminarian in the 1980s was the quality of so many priests, religious and sisters their spiritual, intellectual and cultural depth of knowledge and practice. It was a quality I can see now looking back at the monks who taught at Downside, a monastic boarding school near Bath. Now I know that, but did not appreciate fully at the time, that the monk who taught philosophy and English was one of Wittgenstein's greatest pupils. it is these qualities, intellectual and pastoral, that to me has been one of the signs of the Church as the place to discover God, oneself and the other. The Church as founded by Jesus Christ through His death and Resurrection, and sending of the Holy Spirit. This was a group to which I would be happy to be numbered, a living laboratory of the Holy Spirit where spirituality, learning and culture were fundamental.

What brought them together was the Good Shepherd who called them as they were, each with their own story. None were called because they were perfect but rather because Jesus was committed to them as He is to each of us. This divine commitment helped them and help us transform our baptism from membership into life within the body of the Church and thus becoming in modern church parlance 'intentional disciples'. So though today the focus is on vocation to the priesthood and religious life, no such vocation can take place in a vacuum, every Christian is invited to transform their baptismal promises into life, and life shared with oth-

This Sunday, the 4th Sunday of Eastertide is called Vocation Sunday as the Gospel is part of St John's account of Jesus as the Good Shepherd. Jesus calls His

sheep one by one, leads them in and out of pasture and protects them with His life, demonstrating a depth of concern that outweighs those of the hired hand. Yet can we 'the sheep' priests and people really hear what the Good Shepherd is telling us. Such listening takes place in reading the Scriptures, participation at Mass; plumbing the depths of our heart, and engaging with the lives of other Christians. Then the heart of the priestly vocation can be discerned, of being a good shepherd in the style of Jesus.

One of the qualities that stood out when I first arrived at St Margaret's were the number of parishioners who still talked about Fr Sydney Dommerson nearly fifty years after his death. This priest made an impact because he was a good shepherd in the style of Jesus. It is a remarkable testament that he is actively remembered all these years later.

Pope Francis recently gave a presentation on the priesthood and identified three forms of closeness that follow from the closeness of the Good Shepherd to every Christian. These are closeness to the Bishop, closeness to other priests and closeness to the people. This closeness to the people recognises the pain of the world, the pain within people's lives, neither wishing it away, nor saying this is the last word, but continually giving words of hope. On Good Friday it was dark from the sixth to the ninth hour only. Even the Father called an end to the suffering of His Son. Since the message of Jesus Christ offers hope, the Church, His Body, becomes the place of hope, and thus the People of God who make the Church, have the spiritual resources to create the culture of hope. Now years later I can see that it is the culture of hope that nurtures faith and sustains charity and that what I saw in those remarkable men and women involved with the Church was a structured expression of hope. Hope that was both personal through their closeness to Jesus Christ and communal through their vocation to serve the Church in a particular way.
