# 27TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 8th October 2023 - Year A

# In Peter writes:

Lost amidst the offertory collection, children returning from their basement liturgy and starting the offertory hymn, are two prayers that unite the work of God with the work of humanity. Two expressions 'fruit of the earth and work of human hands' and 'fruit of the vine and work of human hands' describes the symbiotic relationship between God and humanity. Worship as directed by Jesus at the Last Supper requires both God as the source of everything and the daily work of humanity for the work to be undertaken. Bread and wine are the results of combined human effort.

This dual activity continues with the prayer that begins: 'pray that my sacrifice (the priest standing in the person of Jesus) and yours (the congregation representing humanity in its entirety) enters the heart of the Mass. The sacrifice on the Cross is made possible through our prior participation in the making of bread and wine. God's action stands at the heart, no change from bread to Body, or wine to Blood, would be possible without His intervention. Yet this combination of divine action and human participation sets the tone for His plan for us, a plan that is not imposed but that invites our conscious engagement.

Beginning with the Liturgy is the better way to understand all those issues surrounding the environment and climate change. Human activity is mandated by God from the beginning, consequent to the expulsion from the Garden of Eden but also used as the means to sanctification. Pope Francis' document, 'Laudato Si' begins with praise echoes St Francis' Canticle, 'Laudato si, O mio signore' (Praise be to you, O my Lord).

This Sunday's Gospel parable about the workers in the vineyard's maltreatment of the master's servants is an obvious echo of God's dealings with His chosen people that ends with the crucifixion. This drama does not play out in a barren environment but in a well-cultivated tamed environment, the vineyard. What the workers lacked was any sense that the vineyard was a gift. They acted like a selfish family member who cannot perceive the benefits gained from being part of a larger family, and of the embedded physical, spiritual and cultural capital of the place we call home. Their lack of apprecia-

tion made the vineyard workers easy targets for more sinister thoughts to enter their hearts. Such thoughts became actions that ultimately led to the killing of the son in the parable. How easy it is to tread the same path even without following the plot of 'Kind hearts and coronets.'

The vineyard of the parable may be applied to ancient Israel, but to our country, and our world too, as the well-tended environment provided for human life, the fruits being the results of human work, personal and collective, spiritual and material. God gave a world predisposed for our flourishing, a world that required transformation through human effort.

Yet our efforts have become perverted, now that the sense of creation as a gift has been lost. Paradoxically indifference to God and thus to creation demolishes the reasons for the ecological movement, as if truth no longer resides in God as Creator, then the creation becomes merely a place to use and not to cherish. The shrill tones of protestors demonstrate this point as their lack of argument or invitation to share the vision makes their secular understanding all so apparent. Life is not an idea, but continuous activity and so another form of dialogue is needed other than simplistic slogans or inconvenient political actions, to initiate change.

To see life as a gift from the cosmos to embryo, from conception to natural death starts at another place and invites our engagement, because the world as a gift sets up the question as how that gift is used. Is the world the place for resources to make alone or is it the location for the gradual sanctification of the person. At Mass we recognise the participation with Jesus Christ's action, and so creation becomes the place for becoming this holy person. We do not all have to become St Francis, but we are invited to see creation as our ally in our sanctification.

# **Holy Hour**



# ProParent Navigating the Challenges of Modern Family Life


Sunday 15th October, 3.00 pm at St Margarets Church. 130 St Margarets Road, Twickenham TW1 1RL

#### Sacramental Programmes

Sacramental preparations are open for parishioners and those who attend Mass regularly at St Margaret's.

<u>Baptism</u>: Should you wish to have your child baptised in this parish, attendance at our Pre Baptism course is compulsory. Please either speak to Fr Peter after Mass or contact the parish office.

<u>First Holy Communion 2024:</u> If you would like your child to receive the Sacrament of First Holy Communion, please speak to Fr Peter after any Mass that you attend. Enrol on the course during the first half term, from September 1st to October 22nd. Collect attendance card. Applications will close on that date. Attendance on to the Children's Liturgy at Sunday 10.30 am Mass is required.

Confirmation 2024: The 2024 Confirmation Course will begin in January 2024 and will continue till after Easter, date yet to be established. Kindly speak to Fr Peter or Deacon Joseph after any weekend Mass that you attend. Enrol on the course during the first half-term from September 1st to October 22nd.

Marriage Preparation: St Margarets alternates with The Brompton Oratory for the courses. We will hold a course on Saturday, 13th April 2024.
