14TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 9 July 2023 - Year A

## In Peter writes:

Today, Friday 7<sup>th</sup>, is the last day of the St Richard Reynolds Year 9 'School in Rome.' By now I am an expert in the Leonardo Da Vinci Museum, having given the opening introduction six times, built the safety bridge model with numerous pupils and worked the models of his designs. It is too soon to say how much fruit the visit will generate but it included a rigorous fitness regime with the three twice daily walk up the quickly named 'steps of doom' up to the hotel, sometimes after doing 32,000 steps on the combined Latin and History walks! Most, I imagine, will spend the weekend asleep.

Beginning on Sunday evening and concluding on Thursday evening in St Peter's Square anchored the project in the arms of the Church. St Peter and St Paul gave Rome its Christian identity, and their martyrdom sowed the seeds of a vibrant Christian community in the city. One thousand years of classical history would be incorporated into the Church and those elements open to grace would be seen as a preparation for the Gospel; classical philosophy, the importance of law, and the structure of society. Rome did not make St Peter and Paul, they made Rome.

Thus, my hope had been to emphasise that the Church possesses a living heart, a continuous witness to the person of Jesus Christ, and that the Year 9 are part of that living heart. The authoritative witness and its formative traditions of St Peter and his successors made the city. Seeing the city this way turns it from beings a series of dead monuments into a source of inspiration, both religious and cultural. If in some small way the 170 Year 9 pupils could grasp that the Catholic Church is bigger than their parish, that it proposes a coherent culture and consistent way of life, then I feel the visit will have been a success. Drawing at the Spanish Steps, reading Henry James on the Pincian Hill and translating Latin at the Circus Maximus cannot but be beneficial for anyone's education as they participated in the cultural heart of Western European Christian civilisation.

The centre piece of the week was the Wednesday morning Mass at St Peter's. By providence the school was given the altar at the back of St Peter's behind the Papal Altar for the celebration of Mass. It was an immense privilege to celebrate Mass at the altar where the Cardinals gather prior to the Conclave and other Synodal meetings. Looking from the altar I

could see the length of St Peter's through the great doors and into the sunshine beyond. Grasping the size of the bas lica takes times as every detail is expanded. The bronze canopy over the Papal altar, through which I gazed into the outside world is the equivalent of a six-storey building. So, the 190 staff and pupils hardly filled the first few rows of the apse. Here was something bigger than our parish churches yet participating in the very same activity, of making present through the ritual of Mass the saving presence of Jesus Christ in the bread and wine which had become His Body and Blood. Here the school engaged in the heart of the Church's mission in the heart of the visible structure that is the Catholic Church.

Despite their tiredness, the staff are talking about making 'school in Rome' a regular feature of school life. This Year 9 had missed out on the right of passage that is school journey in Year 6 at the end of Primary School and other trips owing to Covid-19. My hope is that this visit made up for that lack. Whether these plans come to pass I do not know but this is a laudable aim which I would hope to support. Though I first came to Rome in February 1976 the city still holds for me the same fascination. Much has changed obviously, the increasing number of tourists and flattening of city cultures in front of the global brands of modern capitalism and the mores of the wealthy citizens from nowhere. Yet visiting the city with the mindset has changed from starting with the monuments to starting with the living heart then the richness of the city becomes visible behind the obvious veneer of the tourist economy.

As I write, over-looking the Vatican ramparts that follow the contour of the hill from beyond St Peter's Square to beyond the entrance to the Vatican Museum, and round past the Casa Bonus Pastor where the students are staying, it easy to think of the eternal nature of the Holy City, but without the heart then it would become an empty shell. The same is true for every parish, without the liturgical and spiritual heart then it becomes a hollow, all too-humane entity. A mighty week with much to reflect upon, to rediscover the heart on which the Catholic project relies.






