## PALM SUNDAY OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD - 10 APRIL 2022 - Year C

**In Peter writes:** Once again, we find ourselves on the cusp of Holy Week, and

re-tracing the path Jesus took into the Holy City of Jerusalem for the last time. This journey is a moment of public joy, the crowds are shouting out 'Hosanna, Blessings on the King who comes in the name of the Lord': an exclamation we make at every Mass when the congregation sings Holy, Holy, Holy at the beginning of the Eucharistic Prayer.

The Holy Week Liturgies begin on a high note and conclude in the celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus on Easter Sunday. Today the Church reads the whole of St Luke's Passion that will include not just the historic event of Palm Sunday, the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem but will extend further to include the Last Supper, Trial, Crucifixion and burial of Jesus. The Church's Liturgies are never simple reenactments of past historical events, they assume the full biography of Jesus including His Resurrection, for without the Resurrection there would be no gift of the Holy Spirit to the Church, and thus no sacraments. The believer enters Holy Week knowing and living the end of the story, that is the life of the Holy Spirit, the contemporary life of the Christian. This does not take away from the meaning of the events themselves but gives them greater significance since they explain the means through which God's love is experienced, through the sacraments and in the struggle of life itself.

The Passion account is steeped in Old Testament allusions that bring out the continuity of God's engagement with humanity. When Jesus cries out on the Cross the great cry of dereliction: 'My God, my God why have you forsaken me', the first line of Psalm 22, Jesus embraces the whole Psalm which concludes on a triumphant note, 'the whole earth from end to end will remember and come back to God'. This does not nullify the original emotions of Jesus on the Cross but demonstrates that this cry of pain is part of something much larger. The Cross far from being an accident of history, was through its visibility within the plan of God for the salvation of all humanity. Such purposefulness demonstrates the depths to which the Father will go to seek our response, by His Son dying for our sins.

How though are we to make the death and Resurrection of Jesus more than just an example of a holy man whose teachings continue through the commu-

nity of followers. Many people subscribe to His teachings in theory but find the practise of faith too intimidating in terms of time and commitment. The key to reconnect is the Mass of the Last Supper on Thursday evening because it brings together the institution of the Eucharist, the Priesthood and the life of charity. The Eucharist recognises Good Friday as the place of sacrifice, and Easter Sunday as the beginning of the new life following the Crucifixion.

The institution of the Eucharist is fundamental for faith because the Eucharist allows the Christian to participate form the inside the forthcoming Crucifixion and Resurrection of Jesus. The words of institution, 'Take and eat. This is my body; This is my blood, the blood of the covenant which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins', 'Do this is memory of me', incorporate the believer into the sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross and into His supernatural destiny. The Cross is the event of liberation from the slavery to sin, and an entry to the new life. That first 'Eucharist', the Last Supper, made present what was about to take place, but also the moment when Jesus reassures His apostles that He will see them again and will continue to pray for them. Despite the impending violence, Jesus gives them encouragement. Particular to St Luke, Jesus gives confidence to both St Peter that he will resist Satan, and to the Good Thief, that he will reach paradise.

We too can be encouraged too: 'Do this in memory of me' is the command for our common future. Every Mass is the entry point into the Death and Resurrection. The Eucharist is not a solitary matter but a communal event of the Church, the successors of that first gathering of the extended family of Jesus with whom He purposefully wished to celebrate that last fateful Passover.

The two following Liturgies, the Solemn Liturgy of the Passion on Good Friday and the Easter Vigil/Sunday with their respective emphasis on suffering, especially the shedding of blood, and the victory over death and the quite joy of Easter, complete the Triduum. These two services are much better attended than the Mass of the Last Supper which always surprises me because Thursday evening is when the Church is most itself, the gathered community receiving the very life of Jesus Himself. Mass of the Last Supper opens the door to the perpetual spiritual dynamics of Good Friday and Easter Sunday, continual death to sin and openness to new life.




