5th Sunday of Easter 10th May 2020



In Peter writes:

The Bishop of Avellino, southern Italy, has written the most remarkable letter to the enclosed sisters of his Diocese. Cardinal Vincent Nichols sent it to his priests and there are parts of this letter that I wish to share with you. The Bishop writes, 'You are the only Italians not to flinch in the face of the downpour of decrees and restrictions which have drenched us in recent days. This is because what we have been asked to do for a time is what you have always done, and that which we put up with, you have already chosen.' This is a way of looking at what is happening untainted by the blame culture fostered by the media or the need to find reasons why the disease struck in the first place. The Bishop demonstrates that the response we offer in front of this pandemic defines our character. The lockdown is not of our making but our response is always personal. The Bishop recognised that educating our response is not easy so he invokes the sisters, 'to you, mistresses of the hidden and happy life, we entrust our discomfort, our fear, our remorse, our missed appointments with God who always waits for us'.

Even in normal times it requires an immense act of will, or donation of grace, not to react in front of provocation and we know how easy it is to succumb to the temptation to acquiesce in front of nothingness. Everyone needs encouragement to maintain daily routine lest half our normal daily activity take twice the normal time to achieve

The Bishop recognises we all need the prayers of those enclosed sisters to turn round the situation around, living cut from our families and from each other. The fragmentation of modern life, that paraded itself as self-assertion and freedom, has probably never felt so painful as of now: 'Teach us the art of being content with nothing, of living in a confined space, without going out but yet with the art of being charged with the need for that inner journey which requires neither fresh air nor trains.' This spiritual path of discipleship takes many forms. Firstly, it becomes a lesson in dependency ultimately on God's

goodness: Teach us that it is possible to live with very little and to live in joy. Remind us that poverty is the unavoidable condition of everyone because "to be poor, we only have to be human." Teach us again about the savour of little things. Give us back that delight in the small things. Secondly this path makes us reflect on the nature of our relationships, whether it be our family relationships, our friendship network and the culture of the places where we work, study or recreate. There may be strands on what we reflect on now and how we conduct ourselves in this current lockdown that we will be able to keep for when times return to something like normality.

This weekend the government has promised to reveal their plans to unravel the lockdown, and who knows whether in three months we will all be remembering what we did in those strange months of enforced lockdown. Yet before that becomes possible the invitation is there to create the monastery of our mind and heart, physically located in my room, flat or house where we can become at peace with ourselves and those with whom we share our life. 'Teach us to do things slowly with solemnity and without rushing, to pay attention to details because every day is a miracle, every encounter is a gift, every step an entrance into the throne room of God.'

If we discover something of this peace within our own four walls, then something spiritually life-giving will have been found within this pandemic. We will also be remembering actively those who have gone before us because we will be keeping alive the flame of Christian hope that transcends the barriers of death.


