6th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 11 February 2024 - Year B

In Peter writes:

Unbeknown to most of us, clergy as well as laypeople, embracing change has been taking place in the Vatican with Pope Francis, not in terms of what the Church teaches but the tone in which the Church advances her mission, of bringing people to Christ. This change of tone may be described in one church word, 'synodality' which baffles all alike. For some it might stir echoes of the Synod of Whitby of 644 when the Roman way to calculate date of Easter was firmly established.

Synodality, is to be understood within the Church as, 'journeying together', much as any family would with regard to the ups and downs of life, maintaining some sense of order and purpose within the chaos of life and changing situations. Pope Francis sees this collaborative approach to church life, of listening to others with differing viewpoints and understanding as one of the key fruits of the Second Vatican Council. No longer does humanity live in a monolithic world which a nostalgic view of the past can sometime seem to propose. Neither the 1950s pre-Vatican II Church of intricate liturgical practices, nor the immediate post-Vatican II years of the 1960s with the wholesale destruction of church interiors in the name of progress were eras of unadorned bliss. Differences are an inevitable experience of contemporary life but, as the concluding document notes, 'it is difficult to listen to different ideas without giving in to the temptation to counter the views expressed.' This is a tendency Pope Francis with this Synod wishes to counter.

Like many Vatican documents the concluding synthesis is long, over 40 pages but the content is a rich diet. Three key ideas are developed at great length, the face of the Synodal church, (to us what should our parish look like?); all disciples are missionaries (how does our parish spread the Good News in different ways?) and weaving bonds and building communities (how does this parish sustain and grow its life?).

Every Parish has been asked to discuss a number of questions derived from these three themes. These collective discussions will be gathered by parish priests through their Dean (similar to a local 'trade union convener'), me in this case, and handed to the Cardinal. St Margarets is part of the Upper Thames Deanery that includes the Borough of Richmond, this side of the Thames, fragments of Hounslow, Whitton; of old Middlesex, and Surrey, Staines, Shepperton and Sunbury. Our priorities, our experience of the church and our concerns and limitations

will be different in each parish and will vary slightly from Deanery to Deanery. This is the richness that the Synod is trying to capture both in the worldwide Church but also here at our local level.

Describing the Church as 'synodal' brings out the Church's richness and the diversity of experiences of catholic life, its challenges, joys and difficulties. One of the tag lines in the document is 'diversity in unity', the unity of peoples highlights our common origin in God, and the common destiny to which we are all called, between which we share our common home.

Moving from an inclusive synodal vision of the Church the document then describes the Church as mission, not simply having a mission but being mission, thus every baptised person is called to participate. Participation varies from attendance to Mass to volunteering within a particular group, to exercising a leadership role in the Parish Pastoral Council or Parish Finance Committee. With this sense of church as being mission, to which we are responsible, two questions are asked;

Q1: How do we witness as a Parish and proclaim our faith to; those who have never heard of Christ; those who have ceased walking with Christ; those with whom we already worship Christ (those who go to church)?

Q.2: How should we organise ourselves as a Parish to do this more effectively?

Having discussed these two questions, a further two are asked;

Q.3 What steps or formation opportunities would help us begin to witness and proclaim our faith more effectively?

Q.4 What structures may need to change? How might we need to develop the way we are organised currently?

When presented with questions of this type, the temptation is to see them as self-justifying, validating what already takes place, (the priest and community temptation), or as a battering ram to complain, (diocesan administrators, well-paid professional evangelisation Catholics and journalists). This will not be our approach. Every parish is a patchwork of activity, prophetic parts, good functional parts, untended parts and holes too. Taking the Synod's image of weaving a web of solidarity sometimes requires rethreading to preserve what is precious, the continued life of the parish.

There will be two opportunities to discuss these questions, one on Friday early evening at 6:00pm, 23rd February or Sunday 3rd March after the 10:30am Mass in the Church.
