## In Peter writes: There must be something in the role that

speeches into a litany of bad jokes, inappropriate inuendo and faux-pas. The fear of public speaking generates a high level of anxiety, heightened by alcohol, to make, too often, an unedifying spectacle. Lockdown precluded these sins but now the larger wedding season is upon us once again, so time will tell if these practices continue. Everyone has a phobia about something, whether it be spiders, out of date milk, and included in the list public speaking. I am forever grateful to a voice teacher, Pat Yates, who came to the English College for a term, during my studies, to help us develop our skills of voice projection and focus on clarity of expression, something sorely needed after so many hours of theological study. Clarity of expression and fixedness of purpose are the fundamental tools for the Church's mission.

At the time I did not really appreciate how fundamental was this skill for the mission of the Church. St Mark's Gospel gives the clearest indication of Jesus' progressive engagement of the Apostles in His mission of preaching repentance. Jesus begins His ministry with the proclamation, 'Repent and believe in the Gospel'. He chooses the Twelve, now they are told to preach the same message as Him. They were to take no stage props, or anything that might deflect from the power of their preaching. Public speaking was all they had to rely upon. Clarity of expression and humility of heart would be critical.

Preaching repentance is sorely needed today. It is the very antithesis of so-called 'cancel culture'. The strident tones of those who want to cancel statues, viewpoints, and those who fail to grasp any problem with current mores both fail to grasp the need for both repentance and renewal. Revelling in their selfcertainty makes the two groups mirror images of each other. The middle path is that of the Christian who recognises that all social structures are prone to the contagion of sin, but who also accepts that conversion and change of ways is possible. The necessity for this middle path may be see in the tragic histories of too many institutions run by the Church. Both the Magdalen Laundries and the Canadian Schools for indigenous children, for example, were established in full knowledge of those societies. The Catholic Church, possessing a potentially large organised force of priests, sisters and brothers, took it upon herself to provide such establishments. Those civil societies passed their unwanted citizens to the Church

who should have known better, as the community to preach repentance, to take up the offer. The premise for these institution's existence was wrong from the outset and all too late for so many were they so recognised, and closed. This in no way condones the appalling treatment meted out by church personal to the residents of such places who should have known better. The treatment of these people shows how the Church, as an institution and in its personal was often unable to rise above the mores of the society which thought such institutions perfectly acceptable at the time. The institutional Church forgot to preach the simplicity of the Gospel of repentance and mercy, and instead aggregated the power and the trappings of civil society.

The command not to bring a spare tunic, to take nothing for the journey except a staff is a warning not to become over entangled in the state and its current mandated practices. These institutions were not established by force but by elected governments voted by the citizens of those countries. The anger expressed today by contemporary politicians resonates with the echo of their predecessors' guilty conscience. So, the warning given by Jesus to the Apostles applies today, to treat with caution the offer of governments to participate in social programmes, not because the Church thinks civil government is illegitimate but because future changes in society makes the Church look an old-fashioned institution holding onto old-fashioned ways of social provision.

The proclamation of reconciliation does possess a public face, and does include the feeding of the poor, the comfort of victims, and the education of young people. None of these enterprises, though, need slavishly accept the cultural mores of the times. Today's easy popular assumptions about morality become tomorrow's cause of scandal. One day someone will wake up and see that Love Island and the like come from the same moral stable that produced Jimmy Saville. As divine advice, 'Take nothing with you', has stood the test of time for the Church.


