Fr Peter writes:

Travelling to and from London for a summer holiday was, I am pleased to report, a straightforward affair with no delays or disruption. Maybe I was just lucky compared to others, but my hunch is that most people managed to travel on holiday without much incident. A forty-minute delay on my return is not national nor even parish news. Not having seen a newspaper for two weeks nor the television I had no idea as to any potential mayhem left behind in the United Kingdom. Modern media possess an uncanny ability to turn everything into a catastrophe, perhaps the age of the average journalist precludes much historical perspective. but alarmist concerns and personal testimonies have replaced the informed news on the armed conflicts throughout the world and intellectual and cultural issues of the day. Soundbites, glib comparisons, unsubstantiated assertions and tales of instant success or victimhood are the requirements of the age. As an avid consumer of news, I cannot say that I stand above the fray. However, two weeks away made me realise the need to put a cap on my news-hungry appetites!

Sitting on the terrace it was possible to gaze towards the invisible Aquileia and Venice to the East, and the Julian Alps towards the north, and surrounding us the Karst, a limestone set of mountains that constitutes Western Slovenia. To historically minded one could, in truly Romantic style, contemplate the collapse of the Roman, Venetian, Austro-Hungarian and Italian Empires. Below to the south lay Trieste, the city where James Joyce wrote Ulysses, a novel that helped to bring to birth the modern movement in literature. St Augustine writing after the sack of Rome says repeatedly that it could have been much worse. The blame for the same event was posited on the moral weakness of Christians by Edward Gibbon, the 19th century English writer. To St Augustine it was the strength of Christians that saw hem through the Crisis, to Gibbon, it was their abandonment of the pagan deities and consequent lack of military prowess that led to the sack of the city.

Both authors are correct. The pagan religious traditions that underpinned the city were no longer believable. Pagan ritual had morphed from public cult to the private ritual of the mystery religions. Christian faith saw

heaven as the true city of God, and not the physical city of Rome. Less than forty years after the sack of Rome, Pope Sixtus III would be embellishing the great basilicas and building new ones too. Pope Gregory the Great in the 590s would be governing a renewed city and sending out in 597 another St Augustine to Kent to evangelise this nation.

St Augustine did not minimise the suffering consequent on the sack of Rome. He commended the invaders who were German Christians for not slaughtering those sheltering in the great basilicas of St Peter and St Paul in Rome. What has been described as a catastrophe was also the moment for armed restraint and the great works of charity. Nothing is ever a complete catastrophe, there are always simple moments of grace and hope even in the most desperate situations. Personal stories of grace and redemption always intersect with great historical events.

These moments of grace, whether individual or collective, always make me doubt the siren calls of catastrophe and the claims of mass victimhood. The current economic situation does look rather bleak, at least in the short term, but stories of grace and redemption, will occur. Just as the great churches of Rome provided succour during and after the sack of Rome, so too the churches today can offer something similar, a sense of solidarity and hope. Churches have been offering the sacraments and succour since the early church. This role goes unrecognised during times of plenty and celebration of consumer culture. Now the temper of these times can be turned around and become another privileged moment for evangelisation. It will be a return journey for some and a new journey for others. The challenge rests on our collective ecclesial shoulders.
