6th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 12 February 2023- Year A

## In Peter writes:

Last week the Church celebrated the Memoria of St Josephine Bakhita, a remarkable South Sudanese woman, born in Darfur in 1869 and who died a wellloved Religious Sister in a North Italian convent. After a happy carefree childhood she was captured at the age of eight by slavers and sold in the slave markets at El Obeid, in the Sudan. Beaten every day by one slave owner, with cuts and salt added to her wounds, a traditional practice meted out onto newly acquired slaves, she eventually passed through various owners before being taken up by the Italian Consul in 1882. Her treatment improved and beatings were no longer part of her regime. Through the vicissitudes of the Italian family she was left in the care of the Canossian Sisters. Here she encountered the Christian God for the first time and as she described later in life; 'those holy mothers instructed me with heroic patience and introduced me to that God who from childhood I had felt in my heart without knowing who He was."

Deep in her soul was the realisation that encountering the living God brings hope not simply knowledge. Sadly, in contemporary society, the knowledge of God rarely brings hope but the dead weight of unwanted knowing, religious faith seen as a GCSE exam. Missing too for most is the liberating truth of the Gospel sadly submerged by the cares of secular life.

Later after a dispute with her 'owners' and through the intervention of the secular legal system and the Patriarch of Venice, Josephine was given her freedom and did not to have to return to Sudan. She was baptised in 1890 with name Josephine Margarita Fortuna (Italian for Bakhita) and continued to live in the Canossian sisters. Later she joined the order, living as a sister for forty-seven years in obscurity in different convents in Northern Italy. St Josephine had found her real master, not the human masters of violence, but one who made her realise that as she said, 'am definitely loved and whatever happens to me, I am awaited by this Love. And so my life is good'. It was this knowledge that redeemed her, that gave her, her true freedom. Whatever our previous life the vision for the future remains the same.

Late in her life she was famously interviewed by a student journalist who asked her, "What would you do, if you were to meet your captors?" Without hesitation, she replied: "If I were to meet those who kidnapped me, and even those who tortured me, I would

kneel and kiss their hands. For, if these things had not happened, I would not have been a Christian and a religious today". Sr Josephine gave an answer that makes her a saint, the complete absorption of her own sufferings into God's greater plan. Her suffering was at the hands of slave traders and owners, not God. St Josephine's offers the remarkable example of struggling through pain and adversity and not descending either into vitriol or victimhood. Both attitudes would be entirely understandable on the personal level, and for some might become 'their truth' to broadcast abroad. Yet for some mysterious grace-filled reason she descended into neither vitriol nor victimhood.

Wishing to know God from an early age, of appreciating the spiritual depth of her soul gave her an inner strength. Encountering Jesus Christ as the one who suffers for us, taking on the sins of the many, those slavers and owners had unintentionally given her access to the deepest meaning of the Cross. That strength did not entail denying the reality of her suffering but of integrating her suffering as the paradoxical way in which she encountered the love of Jesus Christ.

St Josephine Bakhita's life was the example used by Pope Benedict, in his Encyclical Spe Salvi (the Hope of salvation) to demonstrate that Christian faith brings an encounter with the living God and an encounter with a hope stronger than the sufferings of slavery, and therefore faith possesses the hope that transformed her life and her world from within. We too are invited onto the same path, of being invited to grasp through the inevitable sufferings in life, the mysterious access point to God's mercy. At no point did she justify suffering in that way but that through this unwanted and uncalled for experience, she could on encountering Jesus Christ see that her suffering and experience of pain did not describe her life which at heart was with he true Master, Jesus Christ.

You may remember Sr Josephine, the Mexican Sister of the Assumption who came to the 10.30 am Mass while studying English here in London.

Sr Josephine works in one of the poorest forgotten countries of the world, Madagascar. She is working in a country who is on the verge of economic collapse. The Sisters have a school and our project will be to provide lunch to very poor children to enable their families to send them to school. The project would provide the lunch to more than 80 very poor children who attend the school and/or live far away from the school and cannot go home to eat.

Education is one of the great enablers to bring people out of poverty.

Lent is an important season in the Church's liturgical year, the time when we take stock of where we are in our faith and prepare for the death and Resurrection



of our Saviour. Often we lose sight of the point of this season because we get caught up in ourselves—how hard it is to fast, how bad we are at fasting—and we end up just waiting for the season to be over at Easter. Because of this, we sometimes arrive at Easter with our lives no different than they were on Ash Wednesday.

As a parish, we are seeking to prepare for Jesus' death and Resurrection and experience true transformation in our lives during this powerful season.

To help us in this journey we will be running a series of

sessions through Lent on Monday evenings starting 27th of Feb, consisting of a short video presentation followed by time for group discussion and reflection. The sessions will begin at 7:30 pm and run for about one hour.
