Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A 12th July 2020

In Peter writes:

For those able to return to the Church for public Mass, last Sunday was a joyous occasion. Many parishioners though are still shielding as requested by the government, others have travelled abroad already for the summer, and other are still cautious about the safety of returning to public internal places. In recognition of those unable to go outside the YouTube Sunday 10.30amParish Mass will continue and become a feature of parish life. Hopefully the new cameras and mixer that have been purchased will help enhance production levels, once they have arrived and been installed. Last Sunday the recording of Mass relied on my laptop microphone which could not capture either the readers speaking from the lectern nor the congregation speaking behind. Live broadcast in a work in progress and improvements should be forthcoming.

Last Sunday about 100 attended the Church, about 25% of the normal congregation. There is a long way to go before St Margarets, along with every other Church, might return to the pre-Covid levels of Mass practise. Doubts have been expressed if pre-Covid levels will be reached again. The three- and half-month gap is long enough to break most habits, and unless there is an internal drive to participate in Sunday Mass, the mere obligation, now currently suspended by the Bishops, is now longer going to carry much weight. Far from feeling despondent about this outcome, the collapse of the external command with regard to Sunday Mass will help cut away at the culture of minimalism that permeates too much Catholic worship. Questions like how late can I be for Mass for it to be valid; or why do we have to sing; or why do we have a sermon, are all evidence of the culture of minimalism that corrodes the souls not just of those who express such views but others who are their unwitting victims in the pews. The culture of minimalism has a deeply corrosive effect on parish life.

This culture grew up in response to a Church culture that focused on the rules without giving the reasons. While the Church has developed since the Second Vatican Council, rediscovering the heart of her mission to preach Jesus Christ, the culture of minimalism continues to exist as a persistent weed resilient to the balm of grace. The vision of the Council was invitational at heart, presenting the traditional teaching of the Church as both rigorous and inspirational, something to which every Catholic should accept in faith and aspire to live. This way of presenting the faith turned upside down so

many of the traditional ways of explaining catholic thought, never better expressed in the words of David Lodge the novelist in questions about sexual morality 'how far can you go'. The real question is different, where are you going? The Council gave every believer responsibility to listen to the voice of conscience formed by the Gospel. Yet the tragedy of the last sixty years is that though Catholics might rail against the rules somehow, they find it difficult to step into spiritual adulthood.

This Sunday's Gospel about the parable of the sower demonstrates the rich consequences of spiritual adulthood. Spiritual adulthood produces hundred, sixty, thirtyfold crop. Answering the question, 'where are you going?' always produces fruit. No-one needs the exact destination; life is not like taking the bus to a physical location. The Christian's destination is more mystical, but accepting life as a journey, divine providence can intervene and nudge the believer to take a particular direction. Divine Providence rarely works on those with no sense of life's destination.

The parable also allows the Church to understand failure when it comes to her mission. It is the not the Gospel message itself but the predisposition of the soil. Certainly, the Gospel message must be preached with generosity, but it still can fall on stony ground, the arid secularism of contemporary society, or the message might descend amongst weeds where the joys of the material world prove an adequate answer to life. The sower always sows with joy over potential growth. The sower never sows just once, but time and time again, thus allowing for the soil of the soul to change in the interim. Those who were the stony soil or choked by weeds have become rich soil through changing personal circumstances, possibly through impending marriage, birth of a child, or perhaps family bereavement. Implied in the parable is the continuous generous sowing of the sower who does sows in the rich soil, but whose actions will include the rocky patches and the weed filled ground. An essential lesson is contained in this parable, that every parish mission is always conducted with the generosity of spirit and it never concludes. Though the parish has shrunk over the last twenty years there is no need to despondent. This says nothing about the spiritual power of the seed, nor about the mission of the Parish itself. We, as a community, in these times, can remain full of hope and find the courage to embrace the mission of the Church.

A sponsored, socially distanced "relay" on Saturday, 18th July; start 9am

All our experiences of lockdown have been very varied. One thing for sure though, parishioners have very much appreciated being able to follow the Mass online with Fr Peter, and still feeling part of the parish with familiar faces and voices with our musicians and readers. We see that this will continue to serve a need for those of our community who may be unsure or unable to return to Mass immediately or even in the longer term, to support sick and housebound parishioners and help them to remain connected to our church and the liturgy.

Fr Peter's Zoom account and laptop perched on top of a pile of chairs have worked well for the past 3 months, but now we need to invest in some better equipment to continue to livestream Mass to enhance the mission of St Margaret's.



We would like to raise £4500 for new cameras, a laptop and a mixing unit. To do this, we are going to "connect the parish" through a sponsored, socially distanced relay, between parishioner's houses, on foot or by bike! Each participant will go from their front door to the front door of another parishioner and pass on a virtual "baton", that person will then go onto the next house. The last leg of the relay will end at the church.


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LITURGY OF THE WORD WITH CHILDREN





Resumption of public Wass - Sunday Wass

Arrangements

Public Mass will resume on Sunday 5th July under the following conditions laid down by the English Bishops following guidance from the Government. This is a welcome moment in the life of the Parish and I am sure many of you wish to chat with each other after so long. Please resist breaking social distancing however tempting! Everyone should be able to feel safe coming to Church so please respect each other in this regard.

There are a number of options with regard to Mass attendance though the Bishops have suspended the obligation to attend Sunday Mass for the time being. The 10:30am Parish YouTube Mass will continue.

Mass at 8:30am; 10:30am and 6:30pm. The maximum number that the Church can safely hold, following all distancing requirements is between 80 and 100. Every alternate bench will be unavailable for sitting and the middle part of available benches will be unusable. This will maintain social distancing.

Weekday Mass 10:00 am Monday to Saturday

This Mass will take place in the Main Church with the same protocols

Reception of Communion only at 4:00pm. If you have participated in the YouTube Parish Mass or another and wish to receive Holy Communion please come to the Church at 4:00pm.

Protocols

Entry: Please use the hand sanitiser available in the entrance.

Mass sheets and hymn books will be unavailable. There will be no public singing.

Reception of Communion: This will take place after Mass has finished. The priest will receive communion, then conclude Mass. The congregation will receive afterwards and then leave the Church.

Helpers

Every Mass will require two volunteers at the front to ensure everyone uses the hand-sanitiser, and further helpers to give a quick clean to the benches after the 8:30am and 10:30am Masses. Gloves and cleaning material will be provided.

Confessions

These will take place in the Library after the Saturday 10:00am Mass.

These arrangements may change slightly as the Parish works out how best to provide Mass whilst maintain government and episcopal requirements.
