In Peter writes: Much has been written about what post-Covid existence is going to look like. Will office work ever return, will the flight to the country continue, will we ever travel so freely again, will we feel safe in large crowds again? The honest answer is that no-one knows for sure, so it might be better to ask what future do I wish to create for myself, what are the patterns of life that I want to adopt? These strange times are an opportunity to re-evaluate as to what one considers essential to my life.

For some the former practice of their faith will be revealed as a cultural relic. Attendance had been for family reasons or the appeasement of an older generation. Now post-Covid lockdown these reasons have lost their coercive power. More positively the collective fear of not wishing to die, a perfectly reasonable aspiration, and the consequent mantra of saving the NHS may have opened up an internal conversation as to the purpose of our lives, and discovering those reasons beyond life itself. The question, 'why try to stay alive, by adopting the governments protocols of masking wearing and social distancing, does raise the question why? Traditionally, the search for the source of life has been a continuous philosophical pursuit within western culture along with establishing the laws of human behaviour. Christianity and its secular offshoot, Marxism are primarily concerned with the end of life, whether a paradise created on earth for the Marxist or the kingdom of heaven for the Christian. This turns life into a future-driven enterprise. Marxism, like Christianity in the past aimed to establish this kingdom through the force of arms. The religious wars of the Reformation were attempts to establish the Christian state in anticipation of the end. The communist revolutions in Russia and China were the earthly prelude to world revolution.

Our Catholic faith is driven by the future, but progress cannot be imposed by human effort alone. The Resurrection of Jesus is the work of God, and every attempt to establish a paradise on earth in anticipation always leads to failure. This

Sunday's parables about the growth of the kingdom reveals this two-sided understanding, the inevitability of divine work but also its mysterious quality. How does the kingdom grow? The parable utilises the seasons but the energy to move through the seasons remains mysterious.

To me this is one of the great mysteries of Christian ministry, diligently sowing the seed, recognising in faith the inevitability of growth but remaining mystified as to how it might show itself. Understanding this dynamic is helpful in maintaining confidence in the mission of the church and the life of the parish. The smallest seed can indeed become the biggest shrub. Jesus calls us all to sow the seeds of faith and not impose our religious beliefs on others. Sowing the seeds of faith is not to give up on speaking on the content of faith or failing to argue for its intrinsic truthfulness. Sowing is undertaking these actions with generosity but recognising that it is the church as a whole that gives growth to our actions. Whatever modest actions we might undertake whether in our parish or within our family or community as a disciple of Jesus Christ are gathered together to make up the field, the tree, a collective image of countless numbers of believers forming one whole.

This relationship between whole church and individual believer is true for our parish too. Our own individual acts of sowing will bear fruit in Jesus' time and in His way, but they must be sown by us. The parables tell us and the experience of the church shows that someone needs to sow with generosity at some point to start this dynamic. This Parish can only be grateful to Fr Sydney Domerson's generation that they sowed the seeds of faith for which we collectively benefit. Now in this time it is our turn to sow the seeds of faith once again.

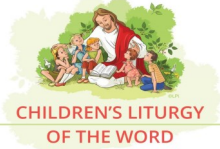
Baptism

Important information regarding practicalities during the building works (May 10th – Sept 3rd)

We are very pleased that the building work to refurbish the hall, lavatories and basement is now ongoing.

Access to lavatories

There will be no access to the lavatories in the church building. Facilities will be provided on the ground floor of the presbytery. Please alert the stewards if you need to use the lavatories and they will unlock the presbytery for you. We ask that parents accompany their children due to safety issues around crossing the car park.

Car Parking

Spaces in the car park are extremely limited. Please consider parking in neighbouring streets on Sundays – residents parking restrictions are weekdays only. Please also try to park elsewhere if you are coming by car to a weekday Mass. Please do not double park in the church car park as the building site needs potential emergency access and it is also very inconvenient for the local businesses who are paying for a parking permit.

Sunday 10:30am Mass – overflow seating

There will be no overflow seating available in the hall so numbers at the 10:30 am Mass will be more restricted. Please could everyone wanting to attend the 10:30am Mass book their place in advance (by Saturday evening). If you arrive without having reserved a place, we may need to turn you away.

Alternatively, please consider coming to one of the other Masses which are less busy and there is no need to book.

I am writing to inform about the Day for Life which is to be held during the weekend of 19th / 20th June 2021. This day, inaugurated by St. John Paul II, presents an opportunity to pray for the gift of life from conception to natural death, to raise awareness of the precious gift of life, and to support the work



of protecting life in its most vulnerable stages through the annual collection. This assists prolife organisations who raise awareness, engage in parliamentary work and pastoral outreach. These funds are distributed by the Department of Social Justice of the Bishops' Conference.

The fragility of life and the reality of death has been brought into sharp focus during the Covid-19 pandemic. In the UK alone, more than 126,000 people have died from Covid-19. Yet in the face of such suffering and death, we have also witnessed the extraordinary dedication of healthcare professionals and their loving care for the sick and dying. We too have each made sacrifices for the greater good during this pandemic. These acts of heroic love are a powerful testimony to the fundamental dignity of the human person and to the respect owed to each life, particularly through proper care and love in the last moments of life.

Against this backdrop of loving care, we are now faced with the very real threat of the legalisation of 'assisted suicide' in our country. It is not a question of 'if' this challenge will come, it is now a question of 'when?' There is now a Private Members Bill in the House of Lords on so-called 'Assisted Dying' and it is only a matter of time before the issue is back in the House of Commons.

This year's theme for 'Day for Life' focuses on assisted suicide and the respect owed to life. The online resources are produced to inform Catholics about this threat to life and to share with people our response to such a threat: a true compassion as the just response to the immense value of the human person.

'Day for Life' adds an authenticity to our witness to the dignity of life and this is enabled by the generosity of people in supporting our work. In 2020, we were unable to hold our annual 'Day for Life' collection due to the pandemic, our funds are very much depleted and the threats to life have never been greater. 'Day for Life' is a simple practical response which pushes back against 'the use and throw-away logic' often at the heart of a culture which seeks to abandon its elderly, sick and dying when 'they no longer serve our interests.'

I know that it is difficult to take another second collection at this time, but the funds are important to support charities and projects which protect the good of life. The Day for Life website is <https://www.dayforlife.org/>. Thank you.

More than fifty parishes in England and Wales, including some in Westminster, have welcomed refugee families under the Community Sponsorship Programme, which the Church was actively involved in designing and promoting.

The programme was suspended for over a year because of travel restrictions but has now reopened and forms a part of the new UK Resettlement Scheme.

Community Sponsorship provides an opportunity, in the words of Pope Francis, to 'welcome, protect, promote and integrate' refugees.

On Monday 14th June 6pm – 7.30pm a webinar for Catholics in England and Wales on Community Sponsorship will be hosted by CSAN and Reset.

(CSAN is the official agency for Catholic Social Action in England and Wales. Reset is the scheme's national training provider)
