33rd SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 13 NOVEMBER 2022 - Year C

In Peter writes:

The pictures from the Ukraine show scenes of devastation, of untrained Russian conscripts lying dead on the roads, of graves of the former inhabitants from farming communities that dot the countryside, and of widespread vindictive destruction. Though we remember rightly the war dead of the two World Wars, and subsequent conflicts now concluded, other parts of the world still suffer the human and physical destruction of war. This Sunday's Gospel echoes that current reality when Jesus predicts wars between nations following the destruction of Jerusalem along with the city's inhabitants and later the persecution to be suffered by Christians.

The destruction of Jerusalem, was the leading example, being the city of the Temple but war will be the enduring experience throughout the ages rather than simply the precursor to the end. This sombre outlook is not the moment to give way but to give witness to the faith, because of Jesus' assurances of assistance.

How can Jesus predictions of the end of the world be understood today? St Luke's Gospel is dedicated to Theophilus, literally the ancient Greek for God lover, in other words a Christian, someone already formed in the faith. St Luke's Gospel is for the catechised Christian. Both Theophilus and ourselves are invited to think how the fate of Jerusalem and the prediction of opposition might describe the personal circumstances of our Christian discipleship. One biblical scholar offers the suggestion of engaging in 'parabolic thinking' of being creative in application of this Gospel passage. Jesus does not give a direct answer to the question as to when will the world end in the light of this conflict and destruction. If Jesus had given an answer to when the only possible responses would be: It is so soon, nothing matters; or it is so long in the future no matters either. Now is the time to take responsibility and thus become a disciple.

Therefore, the current fashion of making everything a catastrophe, of magnifying the bad news, of causing un-necessary distress is nothing new. According to the Gospel these are constants in human behaviour. History is littered with accounts of charlatans proclaiming imminent doom. Some engage naively in this practice while others have more nefarious purposes afoot. Those promoting eugenics, the selective culling of humans, were thought the prophets of the time. The

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world would have too many people. Now their legacy is declared rightly toxic.

Jesus warns us, 'not be deceived' and therefore the witness the Christian needs to be full of wisdom. These are the continuous conditions for 'giving witness' in the context of civic fragility where the echo-chambers of fashion make wisdom a prized possession. The disciple must become a peacemaker in some way, an active agent in building up a culture of peace, and the voice for the victims of violence in all its forms. Earthly conditions mirror heavenly conditions, of cosmic forces of good and evil battling. Battle conditions imply that even secular humanist and especially Christian culture cannot be assumed to develop unaided without positive contribution.

The building peace, of sharing life together will always need the active assistance of Christians. Earthly conditions of attrition, war and destruction preclude the easy option of thinking a Christian culture will develop almost unconsciously. The same failure to sustain purposefully Roman culture in the early 5th century led inevitably to the destruction of the Western Roman empire. It took St Benedict and the establishment of a new social order founded on monasteries to create a new civilisation within Europe. So, amidst the political turmoil that followed the collapse of the Western empire, a new social order emerged that ultimately transformed Europe and was the seed bed for the University and school system.

Contemporary western Europe is suffering the same malaise, of collapsing belief in the legitimacy of its institutions, governmental, medical, ecclesiastical and educational. This is a dangerous situation but also the one Jesus predicted in this Sunday's Gospel. Far from shirking responsibility this is the time to give witness to the humanist culture that comes with the Church, of the sanctity, richness and awe-inspiring qualities of life.



As well as assisting at Mass, I would like the Ministers of Holy Communion to be available, if willing, to visit the sick & the housebound with communion.


