2ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 14 January 2024 - Year B

Peter writes: Last week, the local theatre, Hampstead Theatre, was presenting a Tom Stoppard play entitled 'Rock and Roll', set within the Czech resistance movement from the 1968 invasion by Russian troops through Charter 77, the public declaration by 240 Czech intellectuals against the government's repression up to 1989, and up to the collapse of the Iron Curtain. Two figures loosely based on Vaclav Havel, intellectual and former President of Czechoslovakia, and Milan Kundera, a Czech intellectual, meet at Cambridge University (not sure this actually happened), the first to later join the cultural resistance and the second to remain a Communist party loyalist in the safety of Western Europe, all his life despite all the evidence contrary to the professed ideology.

Charter 77 became a cause-celebre in the West, and marked the high point of communist oppression. It began through the arrest and imprisonment of the members of the *Plastic People of the Universe*, a rock band created in the image of the Velvet Underground. To play music as one wished, despite everything else happening, became the focus of youth resistance to the communist regime. It was nostalgic to see so many vinyl records on stage, brought into the country at the time, and accounts of recording onto cassettes of the alternative music scene in the US: The Velvet Underground, Captain Beefheart and Syd Barrett, the sacked member of Pink Floyd, were never mainstream youth taste in the US or UK. But this was their culture of resistance, one of many in Czechoslovakia at the time.

One can legitimately wonder if the so-called cults surrounding contemporary pop-stars could form a culture beyond their own neediness and broken relationships. However, as I find it difficult to identify contemporary pop music, I am not the best person to judge! Cultural resistance is essential exercise to promote societal change. This was a favourite theme of Pope John Paul II, because fostering a culture of resistance strengthens the faith of individual, gives courage to maintain hope in the spiritual darkness and makes the bonds of charity with others more obvious. This form of cultural resistance kept the Catholic Church functioning despite the persistent efforts of the communist authorities. Elsewhere in northern Europe where the Church has made an accommodation with secular society, the congregations have all slipped away as there was no culture of resistance to sustain them.

Fostering a culture of resistance is badly needed today in our own society. Every week it seems as if one of our national institutions are found to be failing; the Post Office and its persecution of postmasters being just the latest example. What form does cultural resistance take, probably not for us listening to the *Plastic People of the Universe* or the *Velvet Underground*. To some the culture of resistance should take political shape, to others that it should set up walls against wider society to live in a group of like-minded alone. Neither, I would argue are the appropriate or indeed Christian answers.

The best place for the culture of resistance is the Church, because the Second Vatican Council spoke of the Church as being the way of humanity. The resistance is to 'save humanity' and it takes many forms. Its resistance is the strong alternative because the church is cellular, built up of local worshipping communities whose *raison d'etre* is not opposition to secular society it believes in its own life. We believe in Jesus Christ, recognise His foundation of the Church, not because we are anti-secular, anti-woke etc, but because we can see that the true human path is found within the church.

This Sunday's Gospel is St John's account of the gathering of a nascent community. The community is built through word of mouth: Jesus invites the two disciples to 'Come and see', to participate in shared life. Jesus gathers his disciples to form a community, and gives them the mandate to gather other into the little group. There is no abstract Gospel message, no abstract ideas about love, sacrifice and forgiveness detached from the living community. To admire the teachings of Jesus might seem laudable but it is not the Christian faith. There is no ritual, domestic or cultural engagement with others, no coordinated rotas of liturgy or matrices of belief and conduct.

Throughout the play there are snatched conversations about the worth or futility of resistance, to the inverted sense of pride in a public protester signing declarations. Arguments went both ways, for and against. Change coalesced in Czechoslovakia in signing the declaration of 1977 about those young people who loved listening to music, played by those who just liked playing music. This is a great example that may be applied to the Church: The Church speaks about our humanity, our shared life, our way of prayer and ritual. I am not doing this because no-one else is, I am doing this because deep down it gives me comfort, makes me happy and both resonates with and forms my condition.
