3rd Sunday of Easter — 14 April 2024 - Year B

The granting of peace, the participation in meals, staying with families and

engaging whole cities are the methodology and the key places in which the ministry of Jesus took place and where the mission of the Church is taking place. This Sunday's Gospel, coming straight after the account of the encounter of the two disciples with the risen Jesus on the Road to Emmaus and later recognising him in the breaking of bread, straddles the public life of Jesus and the public life of the Church.

The 72 disciples sent out by Jesus, during one of his journeys are told to stay with one household only. They are to offer peace to its occupants, and partake of the food presented. Those commands describe the scene in this Sunday's Gospel where the risen Jesus offer His gift of peace, and partakes in the food offered. Throughout the public life of Jesus accompanies his semi-public meals with the offer of forgiveness, what can be called 'spiritual peace.' These are the tried and tested means through which the Gospel message is imparted both before and after the Resurrection, within the public life of Jesus and within the life of the Church.

The constancy of these methods mitigates against thinking that society has changed irrevocably, that it is on a necessary downward spiral. Social conditions are changing, and Pope Francis speaks of these times being a change of eras not an era of change. What is this change of era, fundamentally the move from the countryside to the city that has outgrown the historic movement of people within the Western world to the whole planet. Cities like Mexico City, Luanda and Lagos have mushroomed in size and complexity in how they are governed and how they might remain habitable in the light of changing climates. These questions are relatively new in human history.

Christianity grew originally through the urban centres of the Roman world. New ways of living the Christian life emerged in the expanding cities of the Middle Ages, the great orders of Dominicans and Franciscans. Another more brutal contemporary urbanisation is finding a response in new orders like the Missionaries of Charity, the Franciscan Friars of the Renewal. Far from finding accommodation with the fashionable mores of the city's rulers, these orders, like their earlier counterparts in pagan Rome, offer an alternative full of

Gospel life.

They flourish, as may urban parishes of the city, because of this alternative vision about the precious nature of all life and the fact that everyone has their place at the altar in the church and the table in the community. Every Christian group gathers through positive choice and the result of the missionary work of believers. Whatever way the parish are gathered, ultimately everyone is called by Jesus Christ. To be accept the call, however fitfully, is the common denominator that unites this disparate mixture of peoples.

Gathering together for the celebration of the Eucharist and participating in elements of shared life are the constant bedrock of the life of the Church. Reading this Sunday's Gospel, of events that took place 2000 years ago, resonates with ourselves, because the means of communicating the Gospel remain the same.

Though much ink has been spilt describing the loneliness of modern life and the reluctance of couples to have children for pragmatic reasons, no government can legislate these phenomena away. Only the positive provision for a potential lived alternative will eventually influence a culture. Such are some of the pastoral task of the parish, of validating the vocation of marriage by being family friendly, and of emphasising the communal nature of parish life. Leading by example rather than repetitious slogans about the contemporary world will effect change. Those minute groups that met in the early days of the church eventually blossomed forth into Christian public culture, reaching its apogee in the early-mid 20th century. That in turn became a hollowed-out husk when its spiritual engine-rooms of parish life began to fade.

Has the demise of traditional Christendom signalled the end of the Church? Far from it! Instead a quiet revolution is taking place at Parish level, only beginning to be publicly noticed, the average age of parishioners is declining. Unencumbered by the underside of Christendom, namely the abuse of power, the emphasis on bureaucracy and the appeasement towards contemporary mores, younger Catholics are discovering the joy of faith, the meeting with Jesus, the celebration of the sacraments and its community expression.

Fathers Kevin worked for many years in Peru and have a wealth of missionary experience to share.
