# ST MARGARET'S PAGE

2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time - 17<sup>th</sup> January 2021 Year B



There is a 13th century legend that the teenage Jesus visited England, travelling to Glastonbury, with Joseph of Arimathea, a tin merchant. Joseph according to these legends was the father-in-law of Jesus and thus responsible for burying him according to Jewish burial customs of the time. The legend of this sacred visit is kept alive in the un-official anthem of England, Jerusalem, but William Blake, far from confirming the sacred countenance gazing on the clouded hills, posed the challenge as to how to build Jerusalem in 'this green and pleasant land'. Instead the apocryphal visit of the Lamb of God has become the testbed for the creation of a Christian society. The challenge as of now remains unfulfilled. Indeed, it never can be, the crooked timber of humanity makes earthly fulfilment impossible, but that is no reason for not beginning. The task will be completed in the kingdom of heaven, but those who took to heart the opening words of Jesus' public life, 'Repent, the kingdom of God is at hand' and made that their mandate, of allowing the kingdom to develop in themselves, their families, community and society will hear the words spoken: 'well done good and faithful servant'.

Today's Gospel celebrates the 'third showing of Jesus Christ', the first was at the Epiphany, when the three wise men concluded their journey, inspired by human wonder, completed through divine revelation and concluded in worship; the second, celebrated last Sunday, when Jesus submits to the baptism of John the Baptist, not for personal need, but out of solidarity with humanity. This Sunday, Jesus is proclaimed by the Baptist as, 'the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world'. These three showings demonstrate a paradox, Jesus descending from King to Lamb, is at the same time entering more deeply into our human condition, and making the effect of His redemption more powerful. John's title, coming at the beginning of the public life, appears towards the end of Mass and just before the reception of Holy Communion. This title, therefore, goes to the heart of Jesus' identity. He is the Word of God, He is the King of the Jews, He is in solidarity with sinners, but His is the sacrifice that will break the shackles of death, along with suffering physical and mental. His is the death and resurrection that will usher in a new Messianic era and He gives us Himself to effect this transformation.

Such thoughts of Messianic fulfilment might be applied to that strange expression, heard on the lips of many, 'the new normal'. Whatever it may mean there is no need to accept it passively as the normal imposed by others. Instead, this is the moment to rethink both the large-scale, how we treat the planet, to the small-scale, how we treat each other. Every Parish community has the ability to help give shape to this 'new normal', because it participates in the worldwide community that is the universal Church and because the Church is found in every single parish community.

One clue as to how to construct 'the new normal' is found in this Sunday's Gospel. Andrew asks what might seem at first sight a strange question to Jesus, 'where do you live?' This is a question about belonging, the visible forms of the society proposed by the Messiah. The question can be asked about our community too, 'What sort of belonging marks this parish?' Often it is so easy, with every good intention, 'I have not seen you at this Mass before', only to be told 'I have been coming here five years!' Maybe be the opening gambit should be 'welcome to St Margaret's, I hope that you have found your place here'. Jesus answered Andrew's question, 'Come and see', and in a way so should we. Obviously during lockdown 'come and see' takes on aa different form, some parishioners come to Mass in person, others are rightly shielding, but the day will come when we can gather once again to worship and this will be the moment to make our collective statement about the 'new normal'. Will this 'new normal' usher in a less religious society in Great Britain, now that Mass practice has shrunk over the last year. This is one possibility but that is not inevitable. The power of the Gospel remains the same, Jesus, Son of God, has entered the depths of our human condition in order the save us from within. He is true Lamb of God, and He can walk this 'green and pleasant land' if we allow Him.


