In Peter writes: The end of the school year cannot come quick

enough for both parents

and teachers. Suddenly infection rates have increased from the end of June, and the current regulations for self-isolation have resulted in classes and year groups being sent home to self-isolate. What would have been the last week of Primary School for Year 6 with its classic leaving activities has had to be abandoned. Rites of Passage that mark the transition from Primary to Secondary, from GCSE to A Level, and school to university have been curtailed and for many cancelled completely. Looking back with rose-tinted spectacles might have given these transitions greater importance to us than they had at the time, but the experience of whatever sort was necessary to have retrospective vision.

These 'never to be' experiences will be replaced with other real experiences of transition in times of Covid. Both history and personal life are replete with 'what ifs'. What if I had done this, and not done that. Would I be a happier more contented person? What if the course of history had been different, England had prevailed on Sunday. The 'what if' of our lost school transition will be replaced by others of family gettogethers and local summer holidays

The same may be said of the national and international response to Covid. No-one really knows. Even those who claim to follow science do not know because despite the mythology, science is about humanly chosen methods, humanly chosen assumptions and human intuition connecting theories with data. Scientific advance and understanding lives under the ethical umbrella of human choices. This explains the wide disparity in predictions because small change to assumptions as to data and personal inclination towards either doomsday or libertarian solutions, are magnified on the larger scale.

Covid has revealed science not to be arbiter of truth or absolute certainty compared with the vacillations of human experience, those that took place, those which did not, and those what if. Science looked straight-forward compared to the vacillations of the human spirit but after eighteen months of Covid this looks different now. The distinction is no longer between science and religion as it has been in the 19th

and 20th centuries. Now it is being certainty and foundation. Certainty was formerly found in science, now this form of dogmatic certainty is found in gender politics and the so-called culture wars. Foundation, though, is the opposite of certainty. Foundation is discovered through commitment, to a person, called faith when related to God. The three monotheistic faiths, Judaism, Christianity, and Islam offer an ordered foundation through a relationship with God whether in the covenant, the person of Jesus, or the book of the Koran. Each of these relationships involves a lifetime's journey, of discovering the richness of personhood and awe-inspiring simplicity of God.

This Sunday's Gospel narrates Jesus invitation to His disciples to go away with Him for some rest, to recharge their batteries after their preaching and healing mission (as described in last Sunday's Gospel). They are to rediscover the foundation on which their life of discipleship depends, to reflect on their missionary experiences of preaching the simple message of reconciliation and healing. They must have been successful since crowds began collecting in this 'lonely place'. Everyone needs rest to recharge batteries and a change to reflect on relationships, the paths of life. A few weeks break brings insights not possible in the business of everyday life. This summer holiday we might reflect on the last 15 months and see where we had tried to find certainty or misplaced our foundation in something lifeless. Has it been the quirks of science, the siren calls of the internet, the glib assertions of the culture wars or might we turn to the foundation that is Jesus and His Church?

May I wish you all a restful summer holiday wherever you may be taking a break from daily routine. I hope that your time of rest brings positive insights into your life and how to build on the true foundation that is Jesus Christ.

Gathering safely for Mass post July 19

From the 19th of July all legal restrictions on gathering will cease and we will be allowed to return back to some form of normality. However, we will come back to normal over an extended period of time and therefore there will be necessary protocols for attending Mass at St Margaret's. My thinking is taken from Professor Chris Witty's suggested of wearing masks in indoor spaces or when mandated to by legitimate authority (public transport) or when not wearing masks might cause concern to others.

I do not intend to impose mask wearing for any longer than necessary but I think for the next 6 weeks we should continue in the same way. Alternate benches will be available as of now but more people can sit on each bench.

Celebration of Mass

From 25th of July the congregation will be able to sing if they wish (through a mask). The prayers of the faithful and the offertory collection will return. Distribution of Communion will return to its normal position. I invite parishioners to leave Mass in an orderly way, block by block, using both exits.





