## **ST MARGARET'S PAGE**

4th SUNDAY OF ADVENT – 18th DECEMBER 2022 - Year A



### Fr Peter writes:

Of the two angelic salutations, to the Virgin Mary and St Joseph, the first is far better known than the second. This Sunday's Gospel gives the opportunity to reflect on the second, and how the quiet man of Christmas, St Joseph, played a key role. A few years ago, Pope Francis issued his apostolic letter on St Joseph, Patris Corde (from the heart of the father) to mark the 150th anniversary of Pius IX's declaration of St Joseph as Patron of the Church. Pope Francis presents a vision, positive in tone, and grounds the contemporary vocation of fatherhood on the qualities of St Joseph who w'turned his human vocation to domestic love into a superhuman offering of himself, his heart and all his abilities'. St Joseph's fatherhood allowed the child, Jesus, to grow within a loving family, to learn as every child does the rituals of family life, the prayers of the domestic church and what it means to participate in the shared vision of family life.

The details of our family will be different from those of the Holy Family but there is much to reflect upon with St Joseph about the vocation of fatherhood that compliments the Church's understanding of motherhood. This vocation to fatherhood in the broadest context, is the sustained duty of care towards the family, wife and children. Such a vocation needs its imaginative leaps, its renewal and gift of energy from a higher power. Every father's vocation is to respond to the situation at hand within the family. Often this can be a thankless task, living in the shadows, of steering a course between competing demands, of keeping teenager's behaviour within the limits of acceptability, of signposting obvious dangers and consequences deriving from the internet, of resisting the commodification of the body through oversharing and inappropriate content..

St Joseph's life was lived in the shadows too, un-noticed to the world. God purposes will be fulfilled, and will be fulfilled through human weakness not just because of it. St Joseph demonstrates that the vocation to fatherhood 'can work through our fears, our frailties and our weaknesses'. What are these weaknesses that Pope Francis speaks of, not simply the obvious but the one of not needing to be in complete control in order to care. The Gospel account of the birth and early years of Jesus, makes known of an angel speaking to St Joseph, of taking the mother and child into his home, of felling to Egypt to protect the child, and returning back to Judaea so that Jesus may grow up amongst his people. Each time he follows the divine summons.

Despite the obvious discomfort of travelling to Bethlehem, of fleeing to Egypt, and later not returning back to

his home town, but to some obscure village in Northern Galilee, Nazareth, St Joseph was obedient to God, who always sees the biggest picture. This fidelity will be communicated to Jesus, so that in the fullness of time, Jesus may say, 'Your will, not mine be done' in the Garden of Gethsemane.

St Joseph's demonstrates that the vocation to fatherhood is to always confront reality with open eyes and accept personal responsibility, even at times when there are no angelic messages. The dynamic of the events surrounding the birth of Jesus demonstrate that God trusted St Joseph to fulfil his mandate, and exhibit what Pope Francis calls, St Joseph's 'creative courage'. God's trust shows that, though powerful forces are buffeting the Holy Family, it is through St Joseph's role in the Infancy Narratives that God's purposes have been fulfilled through weakness and not through welding earthly power.

The same sense is found in the other participants involved in the events surrounding the birth of Jesus; the grace-filled response of the Virgin Mary to the Archangel Gabriel; the lifelong fidelity of Zechariah and Elizabeth; the creative response to the angelic summons by Joseph; the simplistic wonder of the shepherds; the desire to know and worship exhibited by the three wise men. God's purposes, the greatest of which is to become human and dwell amongst us, in flesh and blood, was not achieved against our will but through the fallibility and weakness of human beings touched by grace.

Every Christmas we are invited to participate not just from the outside as bystanders but to take the Christ child into our homes and allow the child to draw out the vocation of spiritual motherhood and fatherhood from each of us.

May I wish you and your family a blessed and joyful Christmas and New Year.
