ST MARGARET'S PAGE



33rd SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 19th November 2023 - Year A

This Sunday the Parish celebrates our Patronal Saint, St Margaret of Scotland (1045-1093). She is one of a large number of remarkable women that occupied positions of power both within and without the Church. She is accompanied by St Elizabeth of Hungary (1207-1231), St Bridget of Sweden (1303-1373), St Frances of Rome (1384-1440). Each in their own way found the path of discipleship within the strict confines of medieval hierarchical and patriarchal culture very different to our own. What could they teach us today in very different social conditions?

Firstly, there is never a propitious time to become a disciple, this path will always be a struggle, and secondly that the path of Christian life is never simply given but must be established. St Margaret grew up in the thick of Anglo -Saxon court politics being the grand-daughter of Edmund Ironside (King of England in 1016. His death created political uncertainty and Edmund's family, including St Margaret's future father, Edward Atheling, were sent to Hungary. There he met the pious German princess, Agatha, whom he married and who bore three children, Margaret, the eldest, Christina and Edgar. meanwhile back in England, Edward the Confessor was crowned king in 1042 but being childless invited Edward Atheling to return to England as a potential successor in 1057. Shortly after returning he died after Edward's own death, Harold Godwinson usurped the throne in January 1066 but a few months later William the Conqueror defeated King Harold at Hastings, and the rest as they say is history.

By then Margaret had fled England landing in Scotland when aged 20, and stepping ashore was greeted by King Malcolm III who proposed to her. It was a number of years before she assented owing to his ruthless nature which was in strong contrast to her own devout demeanour. King Malcolm persuaded her to change her mind, by suggesting what good she could achieve as Queen. So for 23 years their marriage flourished and she did indeed establish abbeys and schools, bringing the rich catholic faith to bear on Scottish society. One of their daughters married King Henry I of England, known later as Good Queen Maud on account of her holiness. After her death, Abbot Turbot, her spiritual adviser wrote an account of her life describing her as 'a virtuous woman, and in the sight of God she showed herself to be a pearl, precious in faith and in all her good works.'

So, what could St Margaret offer our parish today, as patron saint of Christian mothers, in in a very different social situation. Her contribution brought a new richness and depth to existing Scottish society. The same sort of contribution is as necessary to day as in the Early Middle Ages. Every society requires depth, of seeing beyond the immediate concerns of markets and employment, and the distractions of contemporary life. This might be described as the rich soil, commended in the Parable of the Sower where the reality of love, forgiveness and reconciliation becomes the context within which all life, family life too, is lead.

Love, forgiveness and reconciliation are equally demanded of men, husbands and partners too, yet there is a unique female domestic contribution to these realities. St Margaret was King Malcolm's personal evangelist through her piety and charity. She changed him and over the years of their marriage, Scotland went through a Golden Age. If one were to speak of the vocation of motherhood, and without minimising the long hours of commitment, often unknown and unrecognised, it would lie here, of being an evangelist through fostering a family culture open to faith. Through this life for others, the potentially rich hummus of love, forgiveness and reconciliation, and service contributes to enriching the soil out of which our family cultures grow. By extension that culture extends into our parishes and our communities.

St Margaret's life might be seen as that of a victim, being pushed and pulled one way or another, a pawn in the machinations of political both in the dying years of the Anglo-Saxon kingdom and warring clans of Scotland. Yet through her faith and piety she created something remarkable with her life despite the circumstances. She becomes for us an inspiration, personally and collectively in this Parish. There is never a time, where with good grace and common sense, live and preach the love, forgiveness and reconciliation of Jesus Christ made possible through the Church.
