1st Sunday of Lent (A)

1st March 2020

Fr Peter writes:

Now that the season of Lent is underway many of us can reflect how our Lenten intentions are faring in real life. Are we remaining faithful to our original intentions to give up some craving whether food or drink, or to read some scripture every day, spend some time in prayer, of becoming more involved in the spiritual dynamics of Mass? Maybe the first few days have been a jolt and one has the overwhelming impression of lacking any willpower whether in prayer, fasting or almsgiving. This is not the end of the world because it is Jesus' fidelity to His Father that remains fundamental. The Cross and Resurrection are His achievements not ours. The believer participates in His victory over sin, death and entry into new life. Therefore, failure to even maintain a week's discipline is not the cue to give up but to reassemble one's spiritual forces.

The best response to failure is to reflect on where is the Holy Spirit alive in me today? We might ask, how am I an ambassador of Jesus, to use St Paul's expression, today? This means discovering where grace is making me a better person than I would be otherwise. Everyone has experienced the red mist of anger and annoyance cloud their judgements and words, so maybe in all the cases where we forebear despite provocation, His grace is at work and He does make us more patient, more tolerant and equitable. The same dynamic applies to other aspects of our lives too. Once the source of the gift is recognised then His spiritual power becomes gradually absorbed into our souls, and becomes almost second nature. This action of absorption is simultaneously both a divine initiative and an act of conscious human appropriation. Holiness is being imitative of Jesus within our own lives.

The experience of failure in front of our Lenten exercises is therefore not fatal and demonstrates that being tempted is not always sinful. The beginning any spiritual journey involving moral change gives the impression that the experience of temptation is always sinful simply though engaging in such thoughts. Failure to fulfil our Lenten exercise reinforces this image. Perhaps another strategy is advisory and instead start from strength. Where is the Holy Spirit already at work? This tells a different story and now temptation becomes a challenge. To seek where the Holy Spirit has been at work is also to discover where temptation was indeed successfully resisted.

This Sunday's Gospel describes the Temptations of Jesus in the desert that immediately precede His public life. Jesus does not ignore the temptations, shutting His eyes and closing His ears, pretending they are not there. He sees through their shallow pretensions. This should be true for us, that we see through the pretence of the temptations that assail us, not claiming that sanctity involves no temptation. Instead we recognise that resistance to all temptation however tough is always possible through grace. The confidence that the power of grace brings should help us

once again take up our Lenten observances as we prepare for the life of the Spirit that marks the conclusion to the Easter season, the Feast of Pentecost.

The Temptations that Jesus faced touched the very heart of His mission, to replace the Word of God with social control, doubts about the goodness of God and the possibilities of worldly power. The three temptations are highly plausible responses to the different crises facing the world today. No one would be against feeding the world, nor replacing God's commands with another morality as the situation demands, nor that world power could be exercised for the good of all people. Any brief review of recent history would demonstrate how far humanity is from realising these goals. Every attempts at a communist style society has led to mass murder and starvation; the implosion of the 1960s-1970s sexual revolution is there for all to see in the Me Too movement which raises the question as to whether accepting the morality of what most people think appropriate; and any attempts at world government through the UN has been fitful at best.

The reasons for this are that the temptations offered by the devil bypass the mission of Jesus, that is the conversion of humanity through lifting off of the weight of sin and giving the gift of grace. Only a converted humanity can feed the world, can embrace the goodness of God, and can use power for its proper ends. The temptations presented to Jesus touched the heart of his mission and so by example we may ask ourselves what are the specific temptations that the touch the heart of my own mission as a husband, wife, mother, father, son or daughter. These temptations always attack the roots of relationships through superficially attractive means. We may stumble through our Lenten practices but if we can identify some of these temptations for ourselves, this will have been a worthy spiritual exercise.

£80,600

The appeal total is £100,000, of which we have now raised just over 80% which is a great achievement in the time. If you would like to contribute to the appeal and help the Parish to achieve this target please do so. The cost of refurbishing the hall and facilities is being mitigated by the future rents from the Hall which have been bundled together to create a Diocesan loan to the Parish.
