In Peter writes: Year

On 27th March last year Pope Francis stood alone in St Pe-

ter's Square to give a special address to the city and world (urbe et orbe) on the Covid pandemic. The Pope used this Sunday's Gospel as his chosen text. The disciples have taken a boat with Jesus and begin rowing across the Sea of Galilee. Suddenly a storm blows up and the disciples are terrified, and that described the world of last March. They, like us, have been caught off-guard. Everything had been going well. Jesus has taught and fed the great crowds, and they thought all would be well. Such an attitude is very understandable in the western world with its plenty and social safety nets, imperfect as they are, compared to the rest of the world.

Yet Jesus sleeps throughout the storm, trusting in the Father's providence and the disciples suddenly think 'He does not care'. After having been woken up, asks 'why are you so frightened? How it is you have no faith? The Pope asks what faith is that and his answer touches the heart of the current crisis of faith, and with that the practice of the faith. The apostles believe, they call Jesus Lord, but they do not trust: Master, do you not care? These words said to Jesus betray a hardness of heart to the one who fed the 5000 and who will die on the Cross. Jesus does care and will always care.

'Do you not care' can be addressed to God, to the unknown and unknowable out there, to our families, friends and work colleague. It might well be true but can be deeply offensive to those who have and do care. You have tried all you can as a father or mother to help your wayward child, or as a son or daughter dutifully looked after aged parents, so that cry, 'do you care' can pierce the inner recesses of the heart. Pope Francis invites us to discover the potential sources of this cry as coming from the storm which has disturbed our normal patterns of behaviour. The structure of our lives has excluded in his words, the antibodies' that we need to confront adversity', recognition of the world as our common home, and our belonging to each other. The praise of the NHS is the secular equivalent of

lauding those hospital orders and nursing sisters who occupied that same place in years past. Their actions, often given at personal cost of life, demonstrate the reality of the community of all people. For those not on the front line in the early days of the pandemic, had to exercise patience in front of government restrictions however uncongenial they may have been.

Pope Francis draws from this global experience that the first step of faith is always to recognise that we all need a higher power who cares, namely the solidarity offered by Jesus and His People, the Church. We are asked individually and collectively to invite Jesus into the boat of our lives. Jesus will bring serenity into the storms of our lives and because He is in the boat there will be no shipwreck with respect to our lives.

Describing the Church as a ship has a venerable tradition dating back to the beginning, the barque of Peter. Though of ancient lineage and venerable tradition, this barque is not a relic but the living bodily society with the risen Jesus in the midst. Pope Francis takes this image further, and we, as active disciples, are to give the same reassurance to the world of shattered and fragmented lives that Jesus Christ does care. He invites us collectively, through the parishes of the world to create the spaces where everyone may accept they are called and they are the object of our care. He challenges each Christian group, each Parish, to foster new forms of hospitality, fraternity and solidarity in the light of our recent experiences of the pandemic, to turn the pandemic to our spiritual advantage, not just for ourselves but the world.

We are very pleased that the building work to refurbish the hall, lavatories and basement is now ongoing.

Access to lavatories

There will be no access to the lavatories in the church building. Facilities will be provided on the ground floor of the presbytery.
