# 3rd SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 21 January 2024 - Year B

# In Peter writes:

The devastation of Gaza is slipping out of the newspapers, the acreage of newsprint dwindling to just two or three shorter articles compared to full pages coverage before Christmas. Weekly demonstrations still continue but are losing their focus and are now include praising the targeting of third-party shipping in the Red Sea. Many years ago, when I attended an ecumenical study course in Tantur, the rector of the Institute said that visitors who came for a week had all the answers, while those who stayed for three months found the issues more and more intractable. This required level of humility in front of the last hundred years of history need to be borne in mind when discussing these very emotive issues that cut deep into the mid -20<sup>th</sup> century experience of Europe, the Holocaust and its aftermath.

To the western mind, conditioned to accept the distinction between secular power and religious faith, the level of violence coming from both sides is abhorrent. Yet both sides, whether the gunmen of Hamas utilising the method of rape and kidnap, or the bombing of civilians by the IDF, goes largely unremarked within those opposing peoples. There is much sense of victimhood on both sides but little sense of responsibility to what happens to opponents. Both faiths seek for peace, but the safety of their people comes first, and that makes war acceptable in order to establish peace. War is not justified in itself but is waged to preserve the peace of the faithful people to practice their faith.

Here in Western Europe faith has been largely privatised and when any politician or public figure discusses their faith it always strikes a strange note. As one recent politician explained, his faith was like Heart FM in the Chilterns, it faded in and out. Another spin-doctor announced that 'we do not do God.' Such sentiments make so much western involvement in the Middle east counter-productive. Democracy building in Iraq might be a laudable aspiration but counts for little when politics, religion and culture are a seamless whole governed by God's will. War is justified in Western European minds with democratic credentials rather than religious ones. The religious wars of the 17<sup>th</sup> century turned religion into a spent force as an inspiration for war by the thinkers of the Enlightenment and the French Revolution. Along with the correct rejection of religion as the possible cause for war, also came the rejection of the explanatory power of religion for the ordering of society.

What should the Christian response be in such situations. Cer-

tainly, the care for the victims of violence, and Cardinal \ cent's request on behalf of the Latin Patriarch is testament to his concern. His invitation to share that concern should and will be taken up in this parish. Christians bring an alternative religious viewpoint: the donation of the land central to Judaism and physical conquest central to Islam have been spiritualised. To Christians there will always be something unique and special about Jerusalem and the lands that Jesus walked upon, and the Christian communities of the Holy Land will always hold a special place in the Church's heart. Pilgrims and crusaders brought back earth in which to buried, along with the plans of the Church of the Resurrection, as seen in the shape of the Temple Church. The lands of Israel, Palestine, Syria, Lebanon and beyond were Christian places for hundreds of years, but that time has long departed and the attempts to recreate a Latin Kingdom, doomed to failure. Christian churches should be marked both as 'holy land' and 'holy conquest.' The 'zeal for souls,' should describe every parish mission, but that zeal leads to the transformation of society, one that need not take place directly in the political or civil realm.

Alongside the care for the victims of violence, the Holy See has always favoured the 'two state solution' with Jerusalem having special status. Thirty years ago, President Clinton had Yasser Arafat and Yitzak Rabin shake hands as a symbol of reconciliation, yet the hopes of Camp David and the Oslo Accords collapsed with the assassination of Rabin, the advancement of the settler movement, the weakness of the PLO and the takeover by Hamas in Gaza. Whether such a solution is now possible remains doubtful. It hangs by a thread and it would need a collaborative religious commitment to discern that God's peace cannot be achieved through human war. Despite the strictures of the Bible, Koran and their respective traditions, along with the civil derivatives from this religious thinking, war brings large civilian casualties. For these reasons I am wary about the prosecution of Israel for war crimes as it seems to be taking one small piece of a much larger issue, and deliberating obscuring the violence that took place elsewhere. Christians seek to change the narrative, and give succour to the victims but, in my opinion, should be cautious of engaging in political activity originated by others and laden with their objectives.
