Solemnity of Christ the King - 21 NOVEMBER 2021 Year B

### In Peter writes: 'None of us can slow the passage of time and

'None of us can slow the passage of time, and while we often focus on

all that has changed in the intervening years, much remains unchanged, including the Gospel of Christ and his teachings'. Queen Elizabeth's letter to the General Synod of the Church of England read out by her son Prince Edward, alludes to just how long she has reigned in this country. By June next year it will have been seventy years. Her long year of service to this country and her commitment to the Christian faith, beyond he role as Head of the Anglican Communion gives an insight into kingship very different to the caricature presented by those with republican sympathies.

Kingship cannot be justified on the principles demanded by the citizens of nowhere, of so-called universal values of the modern liberal world. But these are not the only values that mark human cultures. Until recently everyone grew up in a definite culture, that nourished traditions of family life, ways of thinking, manners of living, all grounded by an undefined hope for a better future. These traditions, both secular and religious were underpinned by a particular faith that gave substance and solidity to these lived traditions of humanity.

These cultural traditions are fundamental for our well-being, not because they possess every truth, not because they are perfect, but because they give the ground for the way we understand ourselves. Traditions can develop and change over time. Living traditions, whether within countries or institutions possess the internal dynamism to generate change. Where development does not take place, such societies and institutions perish and crumble. Faith adds to this critique the power of the Holy Spirit giving believers the ability to grasp the need for development and how the reality of sin blunts this dynamism. The scandals within the Church were both sinful actions but coupled with the sinful inability to see reality and hear the plight of the victims.

The modern secular world has detached itself from its historical moorings, and the general acceptance that these societies are more accepting, and caring is just wishful thinking. The financial rewards derived from both international capitalism and state spending has blinded us to the detrimental effect of secularism. Traditional ways of thinking are constantly seen as being inadequate and so long-standing institutions taken over by those with not the slightest care for

their long-term future, obsessed as their leaders are about current fashionable causes.

Modern secular agendas have allowed for democracy to be detached from natural law, the immemorial customs of humanity, and through noisy pressure groups to institute change with which most people disagree. Most of us were taught, rightly so, that democracy was the preferable, more just way of running societies but at the time, for me at least, in catholic school, the basic precepts of natural law were not questioned. Democracy had a context both philosophical and traditional, the Houses of Parliament. Contemporary culture possesses this power to break us apart in the name of democracy. The environmental movement and the movements for re-thinking sexual identity typify this atomisation of culture. Shouting and demonstration becomes the only means by which to communicate the message while at the same time national delegations see little further than themselves.

In a strange way kingship looks to the forgotten dimension of governing, focused more on communities that atomised individuals. The citizens of nowhere are vociferous in their condemnation of kingship, identifying the easily grasped lacunae but fail to propose an alternative that would maintain both living tradition and the rights of people.

The kingship of Christ gathers the peoples of the world into the living tradition of community called the Church, visible and invisible, that possesses its own internal critique of grace and forgiveness. This is the reality celebrated this Sunday which marks the culmination of the Church's liturgical year. Kingship may preserve what democracy can easily forget, the living traditions of community, the natural law and the dignity of the person.

A little brief to help you understand the Synodal Pathway listening exercise - The Synod is a participative and inclusive process of listening and discerning that offers everyone—within and beyond the worshipping Catholic community—the opportunity to express themselves, to be heard and to contribute to how the People of God can better 'journey together'.

It is intended to inspire people to dream about the Church we are called to be, to learn from one another, to realise the gifts in each and every person, to bind up wounds, to renew relationships and build bridges, to warm hearts and restore strength for our common mission.

Care should be taken to involve those who may risk being excluded: women, young people, those with disabilities, refugees, migrants, the elderly, people who live in poverty, Catholics who rarely or never practise their faith. And as well as seeking to include all the baptised, the process should include those beyond the visible Church. No one – no matter their religious affiliation – should be excluded from sharing their perspective and experiences, insofar as they want to help the Church on its journey of seeking what is good and true.


#### Also: Garden drop ins; Wednesday mornings
