As a young boy I thought,

12th Sunday in Ordinary Time – Year A

21st June 2020

In Peter writes: for reasons that are obscure to me, that the final judgement would be the equivalent of having your life being replayed in all its details in front of a heavenly court. Such thoughts probably kept me more or less on 'the straight and narrow'. Later I could see that was just one of many possible visions of the final judgement, student visions placed more emphasis on the mercy of God. Developing an understanding of the mercy of God raised a serious question mark on my conduct too and took the shine away from student political engagement. Did every student politician have to be so obnoxious, and why did I have to follow suit? Now I see the final judgement as raising the question in my heart, 'where am I going with what I am doing?'. Far from being an unbearable weight the final judgement has reinforced my waivering will in being a disciple of Jesus Christ.

These reminiscences have been brought on both by this Sunday's Gospel and reflecting on the current period of our country's history. It looks from current vantage point that our society is going through a national crisis, in terms of historical identity, mental well-being, and economic destruction and for the first time ever this crisis is completely non-religious in tone. Sadly, other than the Queen, no religious voice has been able to speak above the cacophony of protest, political diatribe, pseudoscientific claims, and predictions of health and safety catastrophe. All those in our society who wish to keep religion out of public life have reaped their own whirlwind. The reality of the secular alternative has been revealed in this time of crisis. The secular vision is incapable of conducting reasonable public discourse, of maintaining a measure of integrity in personal areas of expertise, of not using the crisis as an opportunity for personal academic or cultural advantage, and failing to recognise that human life, both individual and collective, requires both forgiveness for failures and the sense of purpose to look to the future in confidence.

Times of crisis may also bring out the best in people, and so can we rise to the challenge of the time or do we flail around looking for someone to blame, and get angry



when the culprits cannot be found? The search for someone to blame is fast

becoming a national pastime encouraged by the media as an easy way to promote a particular agenda. The Christian recognises there is often no one to blame as such, because the existence of evil, rather than individual evil acts is not open to pinpointing blame. By extension therefore, all those conspiracy theories peddled on the internet as to the cause of Covid-19 and its transmission, whether it be the installation of G5 mobile masts. biological warfare, or secret societies wanting world domination are all fantasy.

For the Catholic Church, evil is understood as the absence of God, and the question of evil moves from why God caused it on purpose to why He permits evil to parasitically live off what exists whether it be the world or the human person. This question of evil and suffering can only ever be posed in the present moment, and not to the time before the beginning of creation. The better place to start is with the answer answered by God Himself to the question of evil caused and suffering undergone. The answer is a living and loving relationship with the source of life itself. This Sunday's Gospel speaks of the depths of this living relationship that God in Jesus Christ has for each person. It is the summons to recognise that neither evil nor suffering have the final word, only love and peace do. The divine care brings a concomitant responsibility of declaring oneself for Jesus. In this crisis we can declare for Jesus by bringing to the conversations we have about the country and its problems, a supernatural sense of purpose that places history under the providential hand of God. Therefore by any individual, our conversations should demonstrate a sense of proportion about what can be achieved, the sense of reasonableness as to the extent of government initiative, tolerance of those with different viewpoints and the promotion of forgiveness, none of which is much in evidence in public realm at the moment.
