7n Peter writes: Last week I took part in the Cathedrals' Group of Universities annual conference of

VCs and Chaplains. The meeting took place in Canterbury and concluded with a convert in the Cathedral with the different choirs and a mass chorus for parts of Monteverdi's Vespers. A highlight to what was a bit dull! I am finished Covid moaning and excuses hiding basic indolence and shrinking numbers of students. The last is certainly true, whether Covid has much to do with the matter I somewhat doubt.

Over the few days the organisers had arranged for a visit to the ruins of St Augustine's Abbey, the location for the first official Christian mission to England established by Pope St Gregory the Great in 597. St Augustine was a reluctant missionary. He had heard that the inhabitants of this island were frightening, unpredisposed to message of Christ, so not so dissimilar to now! The Pope reassured him, reminding him of God's work, and that the Queen of the King of Kent, Queen Bertha was a catholic with her own retinue of priests and religious. St Augustine landed at Ramsgate, established his monastery at Canterbury and finally died there of old age. His fears proved unfounded.

St Augustine was not the first Christian missionary to England, prior to the departure of the last roman soldiers in 410 the faith was already known, and small centres established normally in garrison towns. The scattered presence of Christians was noted in the Acts of Apostles, though no reason is given why they should already exist. St Paul is told there are many people for you in this city, those waiting to hear the Gospel message.

Perhaps 1600 years after St Augustine's landing in Great Britain, the religious situation has returned to what it was then, scattered groups and individuals living a Christian life undercover as it were, unconnected to any ecclesial community. What attracted these earliest Christians was the message of salvation that brought a social transformation in its wake, and not the other way around. Those who accept the social mission of the Church should be placed first end up trying to defend the church on secular grounds of promoting the good of society. Yet to let oneself be judged by the mores of contemporary society, is to let every passing fashion judge the mission of the church. Secular antagonists will always find fault within anything the Church undertakes, thus leaving the church

to forever apologise for past wrongs. In the recent past it was fashionable to remove the word catholic or the title saint from catholic charities to make them more acceptable to the contemporary world but cutting them off form their spiritual source and their financial anchor. It is too easy now to think of the church's social mission as becoming an integral part of secular governmental or council provision rather than a mission towards a higher goal.

The Gospel message does entail a vision of society that is not yet established, so the church has a pastoral mission that is people focused and undertaken in the light of the Gospel. Underpinning is the belief that each person is worthy of hearing the message of the Gospel of participation in the rites of the church. Noone should be forced to believe to receive the church's charity but nor is there any need to hide the teaching of the church either.

Returning to that original mission of St Augustine, a Christian culture developed around his Canterbury monastery that included outreach into the community, but it was undertaken by those fully formed in the rites, teaching, and culture of the monastery. These were small beginnings, but it led to the gradual conversion of the kingdom of Kent and elsewhere in England. Similar histories are true for Wales and Scotland as well.

I see the mission of this Parish in much the same way. The liturgical and spiritual heart of St Margarets generates a Christian culture that will be the best platform for the wider mission to the wider neighbourhood and beyond. Sunday is the beginning of the week that sets the mission for the rest of the week.

There will also be a barbeque for those families who wish to stay for something more substantial and carry on the celebrations. Please


