25TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 24th September 2023 - Year A

In Peter writes:

Everywhere there is news of climate catastrophe, the consequences of which are made worse through corruption and violence; the murder of Christians in northern Nigeria by itinerant herders as grazing lands perish; lack of accountability in privatised water companies in this country, and the deliberately started fires in the Mediterranean. The Church sees the deliberate damage meted out on the created world as the consequence of sin, expressed in the desire to dominate and waste creation rather than be creation's guardian. God gave Adam and Eve dominion over the earth not domination, and the desire to dominate is always the motor and consequence of sin.

Described in this way, of uniting ecology and morality, makes space for our individual and community contribution towards creation's restoration. So, Pope Francis quoting the Greek Orthodox Patriarch of Constantinople invites us to replace consumption with sacrifice, greed with generosity, wastefulness with a spirit of sharing. This is our shared level of life, and though any one person might think what difference would my contribution make, it would at least help form us spiritually, of being able to practice restraint in front of the multiple goods of the modern world. Individual actions multiplied many times over by multiple people does make a difference even if moderating the amount of waste that modern life generates. Multiple actions such as these set the tone for change, about what constitutes what becomes acceptable. Change to collective requires both common customs along with legislation. So collectively recognising the harm done by the proliferation of plastic bags, legislation can capture the public mood and the number of plastic bags being used has rapidly diminished. Public concern for the hole in the ozone layer above the Artic and Antarctica allowed legislation to be passed banning certain gases used in fridges and now the ozone layer has been largely restored. Law is a necessary part of life but without the consent of the vast majority it fails in its purpose to sustain social cohesion.

Laudato Si, Pope Francis' document on the environment and the English and Welsh Bishops document, The Call of Creation, are both very careful not to make the ecological movement a finger pointing exercise. Hope and Redemption are the guiding principles of the Christian life, hope that draws forth faith in the goodness of God and animates the life of charity. A fatalistic religion would see no point in the care of creation except for selfish reasons. Christianity understands human fallibility but is not fatalistic. Its vision on the physical world is always life giving and life

sustaining, being the providential and generous backdrop for human life.

By inviting us to share this vision of a shared world, reinforces our responsibility for creation more compelling. The Church sees human development and the care for creation as embracing the whole created order, humanity and nature together. Life embraces all life, human, animal and vegetable in one whole. This care for life includes all the ethical issues that come from potential medical advances, issues such as abortion, end of life care, and the treatment of the disabled. These issues sit within the care for creation in array and the time when these issues were somehow separated from concern for creation is now over.

To me the most attractive call is the personal call to live, conscious of the beauty of life, of the fragility of our common home, and attempt to live simply, none of which comes without personal struggle. Of course, one person's simplicity is another person's example of complexity and excess. However, there are limits to private property in the sense that everything belongs to God. Private property within reason helps maintain the social order of society but turning physical buildings and land into a fetish as has happened in this country is contrary to the common good. It is remarkable how much effort and treasure are expended on purchasing a property along with the inability to move into a new property without extensive conversions and additions. How to strike a balance between finding somewhere to live, of keeping the property in good order, instigating physical renewal, and planning for ecologically friendly ways to heat and light the property, is all finely balanced. How this works out in practice is a matter of personal and family decisions but the choices made reflect how we stand on the care of creation. To me this is a work in progress in every aspect, the human world and material world, and though the changes made here in my life are miniscule in worldly terms, they will loom large on the day of judgment because that was the part given to me. Like the individuals given the one coin, burying it in the earth, is no real option.
