

7th Sunday of Easter
24th May 2020



In Peter writes:

Since 2016 Churches throughout the world have been participating in a ten-day event called, 'Thy Kingdom Come' when all Christians are asked to pray for the coming of the Holy Spirit, and this year the prayer mini-marathon is being promoted by the Catholic Church in this country. More details of are available later in the newsletter, with links to some prayers to say each day of the ten days. Two proposals struck me as I read the document, firstly that we are to pray for five people who might once have gone to Church and now no longer do so, or some who have never encountered Jesus Christ, and secondly to walk around one's own Parish praying that the Holy Spirit descends here in our streets

Prayer is a touchy subject within English consciousness. Many years ago, a reporter asked Tony Blair whether he prayed before making major decisions, only to slapped down by his spin-doctor with the words that 'we do not do God'. I suppose the implication was that God would replace human choice. That of course is not the Christian understanding of prayer. Laying out a major decision of life in front of God is to ask for inspiration, to awaken conscience in order to make the right and sometimes courageous choice. It always remains our personal choice even when God was its first cause.

This Sunday's Gospel is the first extract from the Priestly Prayer of Jesus, (found in c17 St John's Gospel). Jesus is dialoguing with the Father in the presence of the apostles. They are still in the Upper Room, the place of the Last Supper and the Washing of Feet. The prayer is a monologue from Jesus who recognises that the hour has come, the contradictory glorification of the Cross, and that the work had been sent to achieve was now complete. This is a unique prayer said in unique circumstances and offers a glimpse, in limited human language, of the eternal relationship between the Father and Son within God.

Jesus did not need to seek clarity of thought or purity of intention. We do, and that is one function of prayer, of not

simply talking to yourself in tones of self-pity, but of laying bare in front of God our thoughts and intentions. Clarity of thought and purity of intention can emerge much in the same way that clear water emerges once the disturbed sediment has been either washed away or settled.

This prayer of Jesus should give every Christian confidence because Jesus is praying for us too. During Jesus' public life He made Himself known to the Apostles, then sitting around the table. We who sit around other tables, in continuity with that first table, are the contemporary recipients of Jesus' prayer, and therefore of the spiritual gravitational force of the Father drawing us to Him. We are therefore never alone.

No-one quite knows for certain what the long-term psychological impact of the lockdown will have on the population and most will regain their equilibrium after lockdown has become just a memory. Three months of isolation has placed a question mark on all those theories of the 'selfish gene', the cult of the individual, and identity politics, because none of us was made to live in a solitary bubble of self-assertion, two metres in diameter. Instead we were made to live in relationship of some form or another.

The Church offers a very positive message that we are never alone, and though we can often at low moments think just that way, the fact that Jesus is praying for us to remain faithful to His mission is great reassurance. It is the first and most important building block for creating the coherent life and so one may say that the continuous life of the Church, prayed for by Jesus, is the essential prerequisite for our physical health, our mental health as well as our spiritual wellbeing.

We pray that the Holy Spirit will descend on our Parish and our local community as we prepare to celebrate Pentecost next Sunday.





The Holy Spirit Comes

The Cardinal has recorded a video of a pastoral message in preparation for Pentecost. In it, he reflects on the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, particularly in the context of the circumstances in which we are living at the moment.




Pause for Faith: Catholic life, conversations and prayer with Fr Stephen Wang

We have been giving away little jars of Indian stick insect babies to local families from our doorstep. They have brought quite a welcome distraction & a lot of joy to children during lockdown. We have homed well over a 100 so far. I still have some jars left & am wondering if any of the families would like some for their children.



They are very easy to keep & a home can be made easily out of things at home (big tub with plenty of tiny drilled air holes, a net enclosure from butterfly breeding kit, old tank with fine net curtain under lid etc.) They eat leaves readily available in gardens such as privet hedge & ivy.
