2nd SUNDAY OF LENT - 25February 2024 - Year B

In Peter writes:

"Are we there yet", is the immemorial cry of every child sitting in the back seat of the family car. Jesus forestalled any such sentiments amongst His Apostles. The three Apostles, Peter, James and John are taken up a high mountain by Jesus where His face shone and His clothes became brilliant white. Jesus is engaged in conversation with Moses and Elijah and the subject, by implication, was His passing, His personal Exodus, His forthcoming death on the Cross. The Transfiguration becomes a moment of contradiction, a moment of glory orientated to suffering. Commanding the three to silence on the way down the mountain only adds to the sense of mystery, of why combine suffering and glory.

For many years in my youth I thought the Transfiguration was about the final destiny alone, and indeed His destiny could be experienced now in this life through building a just society. Looking back, I can see this as being naïvely optimistic, of believing in ethe possibility of living in utopia. Such a view, I can now see, lacks any real Christian imagination, and leads inevitably either into violence or to accommodation with prevailing moral norms.

Without the Cross this accommodation to contemporary mores solidifies and believers quickly become Christian in name alone. The Cross raises a question mark on our imagination, on our unconscious accommodation with the prevailing culture, and our participation in the contemporary structures of sin. When the Cross is removed the paramount principle becomes the demand, not to be judgmental. Nothing is therefore seen as wrong, except child-abuse. Catholic institutions are particularly susceptible to this style of accommodation, and thus lay themselves open to institutional capture by agenda-driven partisans who know how difficult it is for the modern catholic institutions challenge in a non-judgmental environment. An immediate response to any questioning about non-gendered uniform policy, the flying of LGBTQ+ flags, the importation of gender fluidity is now seen as the worst possible of all modern sins, of being judgmental. This process is happening to many of our Catholic institutions, aided and abetted by those who administer but not lead these institutions, to the dismay of parents and university students alike.

Accepting the Cross as the only means of salvation would raise necessarily a question mark on all our conduct, our imagination as to what constitutes the good, on how to understand suffering and what constitutes religious courage. It would also raise legitimate questions about those cloaking their agendas with the mantra of social advance. A question mark is placed not just on others' actions but on our own too. No-one can claim to be completely detached from contemporary culture.

The Cross raises the question about myself first, others and the world too but questions that are answered by the events on the Mount of Transfiguration. Jesus invites us to share His destiny. Our witness and our own sufferings, our personal Cross are the places where divine glory will emerge. I have always been struck by the considered dignity exhibited by many holocaust survivors who became public speakers, and other victims of appalling violence who were able to give their story without rancour, a living example of Cross and Resurrection.

St Paul reassures us that God is on our side and wants to share His care through His Son Jesus Christ. Jesus wishes to share our suffering, an action consistent with His Baptism at the hands of John the Baptist undertaken in solidarity with sinners. Coupled with His baptism was His successful resistance to temptation in the desert on our behalf, the subject of last Sunday's Gospel. Jesus' humanity is the same as ours in every respect except sin, and His humanity radiates divinity as Son of God. The Transfiguration marks a moment when this ever-present divinity is clearly seen. Mostly Jesus' divinity is hidden to antagonistic eyes and it requires the eyes of faith to discern. So, His miracles are works of deceit to antagonists and works of God to protagonists; apostle, disciple and crowd.

Every Christian carries the Holy Spirit through virtue of their baptism, having undergone a ritualistic death and resurrection. Carrying the Cross and glimpsing the light of the Resurrection, every believer may have his or her imagination shaped by these two historical but supernatural events. To do so is to radiate holiness through their humanity. Christians have a positive proposal to offer the world, of closeness to Jesus Christ and through Christ, to each other, of authentic community, one not based on an imagined utopia but on the real-life journeys of her participants. Pope Francis in his emphasis on the synodal pathway might seem to be promoting unending chaos, but the ability to listen, dialogue without losing hold of the truth is essential for the future of the church in a post-Christian society. Rather than hide in a holy huddle, active engagement and questioning of the ideological capture of catholic institutions helps promote the Catholic alternative by placing it in the public square.

The Cardinal, Archbishop Vincent Nichols has CARDINAL'S written with the following message:

'I have heard directly from the Parish Priest of the Church of the Holy Family in Gaza City

and from the CEO of the Latin Patriarchate. The situation they face is grave and most demanding. We were told that there are

still 600 people sheltering and being cared for in the parish compound, together with over 50 seriously disabled and vulnerable children. Water and food can be bought in the local markets at much inflated prices. With the damage inflicted on this site some time ago now, cooking hot meals is only possible three

times a week. The parish is also providing for 200 people in the Orthodox property as well as for local Muslim neighbours.

The situation in the West Bank is also grave with more than 100,000 families losing income because of various factors, as well as the absence of all visitors and pilgrims.

The Patriarchate is able to provide assistance. It can make funding directly available to the parish leadership and is providing food etc. to many in the West Bank.

Our Finance Office is ready to facilitate the speedy transfer to the Patriarchate of any such donations.'

Our Lenten Alms project this year will be a response to the Cardinal's plea to help those innocent civilians caught up in the conflict in Gaza and the West Bank. Thank you

The Synodal Process – Towards October 2024

May I explain a little further about Cardinal Vincent's request to all parishes to assist him in making a collective

response to the first offering from the meeting of Bishops and lay-people that took place last October in Rome. What was it all about? The meeting began with listening with an open heart to what is happening now in the Church throughout the world, both good and



bad. The delegates proposed a vista for the future direction of the Church, not in changing the teaching but updating the tone to suit contemporary conditions. Maintaining strongly held beliefs that cannot be communicated will not advance the Church's mission.

The Synod offered ways of communicating the same truths that recognised the fragmentary nature of most people's experience. This is definitely a challenge! This remains a challenge to me because I have always accepted the intellectual coherence of faith, the active relationship between faith and reason, and the richness of catholic culture. Pope Francis is asking us not to be nostalgic for the past, and by implication thinking that Christianity has run its course, but this crisis is the beginning of a new era.

In the spirit of the second rather than the first sentiment, and wishing to assist Cardinal Vincent and our parish, I am suggesting two encounters to discuss the four questions sent to each parish to discuss.

Question 1: How do we witness as a Parish and proclaim our faith to: those who have not heard of Christ; those who have ceased walking with Christ; those with whom we worship Christ (those who go to Church)?

Question 2: How do we organise ourselves as a Parish to do this more effectively?

Question 3: What concrete opportunities would help us begin to witness and proclaim our faith more effectively?

Question 4: What structures may need to change? How might we need to develop the way we are organised currently?

For those who wish to be involved and offer any contribution, I will be hosting two meetings (both covering the same material), one on Friday 23rd February at 6:00pm, and another on Sunday 3rd March at 11.30am.
