bers against the proposed installation of a modern set of bronze doors at the cathedral of 'El Cid' in Burgos, lies a dangerous view that contemporary artists cannot do revealed religion. There is plenty of contemporary so-called religious art that is plainly weak, lacks the human figure, owing to the collapse of figure drawing in art schools, and poorly executed. Yet that is not the whole story of contemporary art, and figurative artists do exist, and can communicate the faith.

Bundled along with such views of contemporary art is the view that only a naturalistic style with pietistic resonances could be considered as Christian art. The consequence is that the Christian faith, at least in its imaginative form remains a memory of the past, both personal and collective, of childhood prayers and spiritual world, of visits to darkened churches at Christmas. Such childhood memories cut off from a living faith can only lead to an adult sense of loss. Such faith can never really touch life beyond childhood, so in teenage years and beyond, faith is rejected because its meaning has evaporated and the experience of faith just a memory. Strawberry Hill House was built on just such a premise, the myth of a golden age of faith now lost in the adult world of technology and the city. The façade of the little chapel in the woods is the exact replica of the façade of a chantry chapel in Salisbury Cathedral, a chapel dedicated for praying for the dead. The Romantic movement fixation with the past has warped our Christian selfunderstanding which is also includes an orientation towards the future and the coming of the kingdom of God, the celestial city of Jerusalem.

The loss of meaning regarding faith, handed on from generation to generation, once the certainties of childhood faith are passed is one of the signs of the current age; history in this sense is repeating itself. The Roman Empire collapsed because it finally lost its sense of civic duty; Marxism lost its meaning after the fall of the Berlin Wall; sexual liberation is fast losing its original meaning after 'Me Too' and 'Everyone's included'; now cancel culture is trying to do the same for the last remaining great narrative of the human condition, the Christian faith. Most organisations collapse from

within, their leaders finally abandoning the tenets of faith that held those civilisations and religions together.

The ability to hold any organisation together requires the ability to speak to the world that is, not as one might wish that world to be. Therefore, if religion cannot speak to the world today through its message and cultural achievements then it is on the path to collapse from within. So, I wonder how many of the 55,000 who complained about the proposed bronze doors are 'memory' Catholics only, clutching to straws in the chilled winds of contemporary secular society. These are questions to answer before judging these contemporary figurative works of art themselves. To write off the ability of all contemporary artists to create works of art that resonate with symbolic meaning is tantamount that the Christian faith has nothing much to say about the world today.

Pope John Paul II and Pope Benedict XVI have each spoken about the ability of artists to penetrate the mysteries of faith, of assisting in the formation of our conscience. Pope Francis gives rich visual images to emphasise his points, the suffering flesh of Christ, the field hospital, the village square. All images that lend themselves to artistic expression.

The destruction of many fine church interiors by zealous priests who thought they were imposing a new world order after Vatican II obviously makes one cautious about priestly artistic or architectural projects. Much of that destruction was unwarranted, more a transient fashion, than a positive proposal about the architectural and artistic setting of the Liturgy. The proposed church doors at Burgos Cathedral allows a conversation about whether contemporary can provide symbolic richness to a church. The answer is not a blanket yes, but yes within the figurative tradition that has marked western art since the cave paintings in Neolithic times.


