#### In Peter writes:

Modern communication methods make it easy for pressure groups to cause mayhem and inconvenience while at the same time denouncing the general public 'en-masse' whose views on the issues at stake are wildly different. Not everyone inconvenienced is a committed polluter or personal ecological disaster zone. Pressure groups, focusing on one issue, fail to grasp the complexity of life. Stopping the traffic might give a buzz to the 'Just stop oil' warriors but to those going about their daily business, it is profoundly frustrating. No nuance is offered about those effected whether they only make an occasional journey by car, or heading to work with van full of tools, or fulfilling some family commitment. Single-minded causes helps every pressure group to quash their own internal voice of conscience. Failing to account for conscience quickly leads to financial corruption or inappropriate activity as has been seen time and time again in the charity sector. People doing 'good' operating beyond the voice of their own conscience and public scrutiny.

Christianity has been subject to the same criticisms as those of today's activists, of being judgemental and lacking empathy with the real situation of people's lives. Pope Francis' demeanour and way of speaking demonstrates that the opposite is true for the Church. This message is nothing new because mercy has been a constant thread and source of comfort for billions of believers. Sadly, too many believers have been unconsciously influenced by antagonistic secular attitudes that needs to label Catholicism a judgmental religion in order to hide its own questionable judgements. The central message from Pope Francis that 'I am sinner touched by God', is one of reassurance and reiterates the content of this Sunday's Gospel.

Social activists have cast a spell of fear so that it seems impossible to address such issues when they arise. The recent uproar about a school child identifying herself as cat and the reaction of two classmates just shows how the collapse of perspective leads to needless antagonism. The issue should never heave reached the national press.

Everyone has to be so careful not to say something that might be judged as offensive, and those shouting the loudest are always those who most easily find offence. Such fear permeates everywhere and thus the ability to speak and dialogue is being lost, preference now made for the solipsistic enjoyments of the mobile telephone or, if necessary, the company of the like-minded.

This Sunday's Gospel defends plain speaking because all those weaselly words and spurious concern for those who hypothetically might be offended, will be revealed for what they are at heart. These are the people who wish to kill the soul, of making us comfortably numb. Demanding more tolerance with an undercurrent of menace might be the modern way of effecting desired social change but this methodology has not real place. Standing up for the Gospel is never an exercise in antagonism, of being needlessly rude, becoming angry, nor seeking out imaginary secular enemies within public life. This is difficult when confronted by the brazen arrogance of self-satisfied. Everything will be uncovered, the Gospel tells us, but our task is to stand firm.

Recognising the simple tenets of Christian anthropology offers the foundation for our answers to these issues. Firstly, everyone is made in the image and likeness of God, and this is not an impersonal relationship but one of care; 'every hair on your head has been counted'. The image between God and humanity is not passive, some thing, but active, the power of the soul. Becoming the likeness is only possible through the life of faith, whether explicit or implicit. Explicit faith, identifying Jesus Christ as the fullness of humanity and accepting His gift of grace, is the motorway, while an implicit faith, made known in the natural law, and with weakness of will included is the B road. Such was the explanation offered by Fr Gerry O'Collins, the Professor of Fundamental Theology in Rome. His account might not give sufficient account on the reality of sin, and the impermeable guality of secular culture but it is a good place to start.

Being a missionary disciple in today's society is not about joining demonstrations, shouting loudly, self-identifying but reassuring others that God does care for them, and their identity is precious at the deepest level, that of the immortal soul, deeper than chosen pronouns, deeper than racial identity, wealth and social position. Through the Church we live in communion, 'the communion of saints' both in eternity and now. This communion cannot be destroyed by any human authority, it is the ultimate source of quite strength for life.


#### Stewardship Sunday


## 2022 Accounts showed a small net surplus of £23,572\*, however this masks the fact that the parish relies on outside income to cover day to day expenses

#### **Building Fund**



- Offertory remains by far the biggest contributor to parish income, amounting to [56%] of the total (including Gift Aid). This Parish cannot function without your help!
- However, it is not enough to cover the running costs/repairs of the Church, and we are reliant on "business" income; hall and car park rentals, lodgers in the Presbytery.
- 2022 Excludes income and expenditure from building fund (included from 2023)
- Net profit is overstated by roughly £8000 due to timing of utility bills.
- For the 2023 budget, we are now including donations to the building fund as part of the operating income (in previous years donations were ring fenced in separate fund so that we could unlock the loan for the building fund. We are thus showing a notional increase in income, but in reality it is largely unchanged year on year
- Our costs, on the other hand, are going up considerably, driven primarily by increased utility costs and needed repairs to the Church and Presbytery
- The parish has on outstanding loan of £89k which are are repaying at about £17,000 per year

23% of offertory giving is based on loose plate and contactless donations; moving towards standing orders or payroll giving allows more certainty of income and allows us to reclaim a higher percentage of gift aid

#### Works included:

- New kitchen and bar area with 3 minute dishwashers, new countertops, and illuminated etching of St. Margaret
- Refurbished floor
- Refurbished lavatory facilities
- Remodelled basement area to provide better meeting space
- Wheelchair lift to ensure basement meeting space is accessible to all
- Loan will need to be repaid at an estimated rate of £17k year (based on current BoE base rate over the next seven years
