OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE - 26 November 2023 - Year A

This week I have been attending a worldwide conference of chaplains of Catholic Universities in Rome. One of the best reasons to attend, other than the obvious culinary delights of the city, is the chance to meet other Chaplains. So, this morning the Chaplain of the Catholic University of Ivory Coast explained that the University had a separate campus in each of the Francophone countries of West Africa, thus precipitating international travel every month. no longer can I complain of travelling to Strawberry Hill. Another African chaplain, on a much more serious note, spoke about how his staff were trying to keep their students safe

from internecine violence. Speakers from all the parts of

the world gave their testimony so it was encouraging that

as a chaplain of a Catholic University I was part of some-

thing much greater.

Another speaker, a Jesuit priest, Antonio Spadaro, former editor of a leading Catholic newspaper, spoke of the nature of Christian hope as the antidote to the fragmentation of contemporary life. Taking the parable of the Ten Bridesmaids, he distinguished between what is probable and what is possible. None of the bridesmaid knew quite what they were waiting for, ignorant of what lay beyond the door of the groom's house. This ignorance is the possible of faith, the probable is a matter of economics, as the endless acres of print dedicated to economic outlook indicate. Faith's emphasis on the possible opens the imagination to see an alterative future. At the very beginning of the Gospel, Jesus announces the coming of the kingdom of God without giving any details. Packing the proclamation of the kingdom of God with humanly-limited details would deaden the mission of preaching the Gospel. Abandoning detail would be not be a successful strategy for selling a house, a car, or making a lifestyle purchase but it allows the Holy Spirit to guide the content of the Gospel.

Chaplaincy is the precious location for the possible future to take place, whether it is the study of the Gospels, acts of worship and adoration, as well as charitable, communitarian or political endeavour. I can see this so clearly in St Mary's. Last week a student, off his own back, arranged an Ecumenical Vespers with a Greek Orthodox and Syrian Orthodox priests in attendance alongside myself. Hearing the Our Father sung in Syriac/Aramaic, the language of Jesus, by the priest and a student with his family was a precious moment, connecting us both to time of the Apostles and the suffering church in the Middle East. Recent wars and revolutions in Syria, Iraq, Gaza, and antagonism in Israel itself, has shrink the size of the Christian community in those nations.

Reviewing the conference in the light of the recent Synod and Pope Francis' first Encyclical Evengelii Gaudium (The

joy of the Gospel) of 10 years ago, the focus in on the preparation for receiving the Gospel. Too often the answers have been given before the questions were asked. Like a teacher or parent who never lets thoughts to germinate, the Church has been adept at answering her questions rather than listening to the questions being asked. Such an attitude of listening is not the prelude to doctrinal or moral relativism, as if anything is OK. This method of allowing questions to emerge, and not giving prepackaged details echoes the method adopted in the Gospels. The content of the Gospels is the biography of Jesus Christ, how the individual engages with that content remains unique, and it is that uniqueness that becomes the faith of the Church with growing engagement with the life and teaching of the Church.

Pope Francis talks about the polyhedric quality of Catholic truth, of the many fragments that together make the truth. Previously truth was seen as a monolith, and if given visual form, comprised a sphere, all parts equidistant from the centre forming a perfect shape. Both images are of solid shapes, their difference lies in their respective understanding of time, the first speaks of eternity, the second of history. Their respective images might be the contrast between the rural landscapes of southern Europe, the eternal pattern of the country life, while the second might be seen in the urban metropoli of the world. Daily struggle takes a different shape in the city compared to that of the countryside.

Why would any of this be of relevance to this or any parish. Its relevance lies in recognising the changed experience of students and young people today compared to an older generation's collective experience of their youth. Those who lament the demise of the 1968 flower power generation and the activism of the 1970s, I would suggest, also lament the decline of organisations of Cafod and Oxfam. Those who were young people in the 1980s 1990s and 2000s have seen the demise of communism and now capitalism and the respective decline of organisations such as Aid to the Church in Need. Collective charitable endeavours discern the lacunae in culture, thus as culture changes so does its charitable impulse change. Food banks, environmental charities and personal connection with missionaries are the newish responses to the underside of contemporary culture.

Every Chaplain at the Conference was asked to seek the possible and not settle for the probable in their ministry. Something similar could be said about every parish, by allowing the possible, to emphasise initiatives as the place to encounter the Holy Spirit, and not just resort to the probable content of timeless chaplaincy or parish diaries.
