2nd SUNDAY OF LENT - 28th February 2021 Year B

In Peter writes:

"Are we there yet", is the immemorial cry of every child sitting in the back seat of the family car. Jesus forestalled any such adult sentiments amongst His Apostles. The three Apostles, Peter, James and John are taken up a high mountain and where His face shone and His clothes became brilliant white. Jesus is engaged in conversation with Moses and Elijah and the subject, as St Luke reports was His passing, His personal Exodus, His forthcoming death on the Cross. A moment of complete contradiction, a moment of glory orientated to suffering. Commanding the three to silence on the way down the mountain only adds to the sense of mystery, of why combine suffering and glory.

For many years I have always thought the Transfiguration was about the final destiny alone, but the destiny of Jesus would only become accessible through the Cross. What might have been learnt in these months of pandemic is the all to real sense of suffering, those who suffered unto death, those who suffered for months with long Covid, those who are mourning a loved one who has died, those unable to meet as families. The list is endless but there have also been given moments of glory, Captain Tom, aged people who have recovered, the ingenious ways of expressing love and solidarity in lockdown, the achievements of scientists and the medical profession and the precious quality of life itself.

No-one looks to suffer. Suffering is placed upon us, whether from without, by the world, by others, or from within as a consequence of our own actions. Whatever its source, how one reacts is always personal. Events on the Mount of Transfiguration invite us to share in the destiny of Jesus, making our own sufferings our personal Cross through which divine glory will emerge. I have always been struck by the dignity exhibited by holocaust and genocide survivors who became public speakers. Immaculee, a Rwandan genocide survivor, one of the speakers at a

past Alpha Conference, gave her story which concluded a visit to her father's executioner on his death-bed to complete the cycle of forgiveness initiated by herself. After the years all she could see when she met him was a broken pitiful man in a cell, hardly a man at all. No-one would wish to go through what she had and thousands never survived the genocide, but her humanity, and those like her, showed the glory while the executioner's humanity had shrivelled up.

St Paul reassures us that God is one our side and wants to share His care through His Son Jesus Christ. Jesus wishing to share our suffering is consistent with His Baptism at the hands of John the Baptist undertaken in solidarity with sinners, and His successful resistance to temptation in the desert on our behalf, the subject of last Sunday's Gospel. Jesus' humanity is the same as ours in every respect except sin, but His humanity radiates divinity as Son of God. The Transfiguration marks a moment when this ever-present divinity is seen visibly. Mostly Jesus' divinity is hidden to antagonistic eyes and it requires the eyes of faith to discern. So, His miracles are works of deceit to antagonists and works of God to protagonists, apostle, disciple and crowd.

Every Christian also carries the Holy Spirit through virtue of their baptism, and so is able to radiate holiness through their humanity. This Lent, in the words of the presenter of the Lent Course, every Christian should ask for everything, a complete transfiguration of present life. Fr Mark, the presenter, argues that we ask for too little from God. Ask for everything and at least some part of us will be transfigured and where there was shadow, light will shine.
