Solemnity of St Peter & St Paul - Year A

28th June 2020



This was also the week that marked the beginning of the

end of lockdown, something to which all of us can appreciate, though the vast crowds on the South Coast were anticipating the return to some sort of normality too quickly. This period is time of transition but as to what changes and what remains the same o our former way of life no-one is yet in a position to say. There are plenty of theories but few hard facts.

The two Feast Days, the Birth of John the Baptist and The Martyrdom of Sts Peter and Paul (this Sunday) involve individuals who shared something of the confusion of these days. They crossed, as can be seen in retrospect, the bridge between two distinct cultural zones but at the time the course of events looked very different.

Towards the end of his life John the Baptist had to send messengers whilst he was in prison to check that Jesus really was the Christ. He became unsure as to whether proclaiming the coming of the Messiah, his life's work, had been to no avail. Jesus reassures his messengers that the kingdom had indeed broken into the world. His doubts were answered. Despite his questions John the Baptist had spanned two worlds, the closing of the Old and birth of the New Testament.

This Sunday the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul marks another crossing that between the New Testament and world history. The Gospel account is at heart history interpreted through faith in the identity of Jesus Christ. Rome, though, their city of destiny, is a historical place of a different magnitude to the villages of the Holy Land and requiring no faith in its existence or then importance. Travelling to Rome, St Peter and St Paul entered world history and brought the Christian faith to a universal audience. Their tombs are still there whose veracity has been corroborated by archaeologists thus answering the questions of doubters.

Outside the city are two monuments to the saints, a small chapel on the Via Appia Antica, entitled, 'Domine quo vadis?' (Lord, where are you going?), the site of Jesus appearing to St Peter heading into the city the moment St Peter was having second thoughts, and the Monastery of Tre Fontane (Three Fountains) where St Paul was beheaded

having been betrayed by a member of the community. The first location resonates with

St Peter's indecision, his constant ability to misunderstand Jesus' teaching, and his denial of Jesus the night of his arrest. The second, the site of St Paul's martyrdom, demonstrates the courage of St Paul, the tireless missionary who preached the Gospel throughout present-day Turkey and Greece. He describes his life as a libation poured away, and it is fitting that by tradition three springs of water gushed forth after his execution.

Both these pilgrimage sites, along with the traditional basilicas of Sts Peter and Paul, testify to the transition from the world of the New Testament to world history. This is similar to our journey too, from good idea, what someone might disparage as the time of wishful thinking, to become our way of life. The person of Jesus, His vision and understanding of the human vocation and His offer of forgiveness progressively becomes our identity too. This takes courage as St Peter found on the Via Appia Antica, but ultimately makes sense as St Paul witnessed by offering his life.

The visible Church Sts Peter and Paul founded in Rome is the communal umbrella that provides a spiritual canopy under which every Christian life unfolds. The Church offers the sacraments and spiritual solidarity for the journey of faith, and recognises that every Christian possesses in themselves, both Christ's victory over sin and the failures and limitations of their condition. But like Sts Peter and Paul, with grace every Christian can perpetually pass over from their former ways of life to new ways of life. Great things are possible when grace animates the soul. We too can offer our society the template for change that promotes a Christian humanism that both recognises the worth of each individual and the individual and collective failures of ourselves and our society. Pulling down statues is the easy bit, replacing them no so difficult, creating a just society a great leap in complexity. Here the Christian can show their true constructive voice.

Peter said to Jesus: You are Christ, the Son of the living God. And Jesus replied: You are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church.


THE FINANCIAL WELFARE OF ST MARGARET'S

LITURGY OF THE WORD WITH CHILDREN





Bishops stand in solidarity with sisters and brothers in the USA against evil of racism



On behalf of the Bishops' Conference, Bishop Declan Lang, Lead Bishop for International Affairs, and Bishop Paul McAleenan (pictured), Lead Bishop for Racial Justice, issued the following statement expressing the Bishops' solidarity with sisters and brothers in the USA as they challenge the evil of racism and the brutal killing of George Floyd:

'We stand in solidarity with our sisters and brothers in the USA as they challenge the evil of racism and the brutal killing of George Floyd. As the US Bishops made clear: "we cannot turn a blind eye to these atrocities and yet still try to profess to respect every human life. We serve a God of love, mercy, and justice."

'Systemic racism is embedded in our own society. The disproportionate harm suffered by BAME people throughout the COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted profound inequalities, marginalisation and injustice here in the UK. The peaceful Black Lives Matter protests taking place in our towns and cities this week reflect the understandable anger that so many people feel about this.

'As Catholics we recognise that racism is an evil which must be opposed; we all have a responsibility for actively promoting racial justice. Whenever we ignore racism or dismiss BAME people's experience of it, we are complicit in violations of human dignity. We pray for God's help to overcome racism in all its forms and that we might protect everyone who suffers its consequences. We are all made in God's image.'

Resumption of public Mass - Sunday Mass Arrangements

Public Mass will resume on Sunday 5th July under the following conditions laid down by the English Bishops following guidance from the Government. This is a welcome moment in the life of the Parish and I am sure many of you wish to chat with each other after so long. Please resist breaking social distancing however tempting! Everyone should be able to feel safe coming to Church so please respect each other in this regard.

There are a number of options with regard to Mass attendance though the Bishops have suspended the obligation to attend Sunday Mass for the time being. The 10:30am Parish YouTube Mass will continue.

Mass at 8:30am; 10:30am and 6:30pm. The maximum number that the Church can safely hold, following all distancing requirements is between 80 and 100. Every alternate bench will be unavailable for sitting and the middle part of available benches will be unusable. This will maintain social distancing.

Reception of Communion only at 4:00pm. If you have participated in the YouTube Parish Mass or another and wish to receive Holy Communion please come to the Church at 4:00pm.

Protocols

Entry: Please use the hand sanitiser available in the entrance.

Mass sheets and hymn books will be unavailable. There will be no public singing.

Reception of Communion: This will take place after Mass has finished. The priest will receive communion, then conclude Mass. The congregation will receive afterwards and then leave the Church.

Helpers

Every Mass will require two volunteers at the front to ensure everyone uses the hand-sanitiser, and further helpers to give a quick clean to the benches after the 8:30am and 10:30am Masses. Gloves and cleaning material will be provided.

Weekday Mass 10:00am Monday to Saturday

This Mass will take place in the Main Church with the same protocols

Confessions

These will take place in the Library after the Saturday 10:00am Mass.

These arrangements may change slightly as the Parish works out how best to provide Mass whilst maintain government and episcopal requirements.
