4th Sunday in Ordinary Time - 29 January 2023- Year A

In Peter writes:

Sitting on the Mount of Beatitudes gazing across the Sea of Galilee would turn even the most sceptical individual into thinking that something special must have happened here. Galilee is a spiritual and ecological microcosm. The truth of the Gospel exudes from the land, and from the ruins of the villages that Jesus visited along with rituals of contemporary life. Gazing on the beauty of Galilee, its verdant countryside and soft hills only speaks of the first part of Jesus' public life as He will ascend to Jerusalem. So added to Galilee and the Beatitudes must be added even the harsh desert and striking mountains of the Sinai and the Ten Commandments. Both places are part of God's creation and both locations of His revelation, both places are sacred and where His will is made known to His people and His disciples.

It might seem attractive to replace the Ten Commandments with the Beatitudes, of replacing 'do not' with 'become' instead – so 'blessed are the peacemakers' is a more attractive proposition than the command, 'Thou shalt not kill'; or 'blessed are the poor in spirit' than the command, 'Thou shalt have no other God but me'. Yet without the first, the Commandments, the second, the Beatitudes, would lose their impact, no longer being conscious choices made consistently over time but shrunk to vague generalities. No-one can become a peacemaker with violence in their heart; no-one can love God with a sense of entitlement.

Each Beatitude aims to inspire the internal conversion of mind and heart because they make it possible for the believer to see the world in the light of God's promises without ignoring the present reality of suffering, of frustration and hopelessness. Living the Beatitudes is living the end times of heaven, of tasting heaven on earth but always in a sign of contradiction. Thus 'Blessed are the poor of spirit theirs in the kingdom of God, Blessed are those who mourn they shall be comforted.' Nothing has to be perfect before the Christian can experience a little of heaven, even if in contradiction. All our lives are littered with

half-promises made to ourselves; I will do this when ... failing to act until the conditions are right; when I am less busy I will; when I retire, when I leave school. The Beatitudes are for now, not some distant ideal future.

Every Beatitude for the Christian is both Cross and Resurrection, both present reality and future hope. Presenting contradiction at the heart of moral experience help makes sense of our memories too because life is not simply black or white, good times or bad times. Nor is our life simply a shade of grey depending. Maybe life is more like a QR code, a multitude of black and white dots potentially offering an access code. To the Christian this access code is to heavenly realities. Contradiction marks our moral choices, between pursuing the right decision and satisfying our personal predilections.

Moral progress is marked not by denying the contradictions in our behaviour but in allowing grace to write a message as if a QR code. The Saints never did not sin, it was just that their lives radiated the message of divine grace working through weak human willpower. Seeing these contradictions within our lived experience, within our moral choices and within our hopes for life but anticipating the gift of grace that will turn this seemingly meaningless collection into a definitive message will help answer some questions that dominates mental health issues of young and old alike. No situation is ever completely hopeless, nor is it possible to find the perfect sunny place where everything is in good order. The Beatitudes anchor life in the real world while at the same time writing the code that gives life meaning and offer an exit from meaningless.


Funeral for Patricia 'Mary' Picton
