*In Peter writes:*

Today's conflict between Israel and the rulers of the Gaza Strip demonstrate how the misapplication of conscience has murderous consequences. Popular reactions in the west, mostly supportive of the rulers of the Gaza Strip demonstrate too the collapse in understanding of the proper role of conscience. Declaring the supremacy of conscience within a secular society might not lead directly to violence but it sets the tone for the culture of 'my truth', and placing sincerity above truth. Rejecting all forms of external authority whether of parents by children, of society by individuals, leads eventually to the rejection of objective truth. This does not mean that every decision made by external authority is always correct, but learning from others the distinction between right and wrong, is a necessary part of becoming a functioning member of family, community and society.

Thus, the current conflict in the Middle East being fought through WhatsApp, TikTok and other platforms is being undertaken largely lacking in the proper use of conscience. Both sides are sincere in their avowed destruction of each other, either as their political *raison d'être* or out of perceived necessity. Sincerity here leads to violence because conscience far from being an opening to the truth has become a protective mantle over the ego.

To the Christian, access to the truth is at the heart of faith, not truth as an abstract concept but made known as a person, Jesus Christ. Faith in Jesus Christ comes about by recognising the pivotal role of conscience. The Psalmist wrote, 'Lord, forgive me for my unknown faults.' (Ps 19:12-3). Only through dialogue with God can a proper estimation of my actions be appreciated, and the internal life of believers is this developing understanding on what is right. Jesus' gift of grace and reconciliation responds to this awakening understanding. Teenage years are just one phase of this potential transformation between the blind acceptance by children of their parents' authority, and the ability to see moral choices are more than just subjective choices. To see conscience as something more than the ego's wishes, allows space for authentic human development, of a life given to others, of a life open to the adventures of grace.

To possess faith is to accept the higher power of God. This requires humility, a difficult characteristic to nurture in secular society when every difficulty is cast as a battle between 'my rights' and the country, the government, the council, the community, the school, my family etc. Here might lie the reason why so many Catholics stop receiving the spiritual power (grace) derived from the Eucharist. The transformation from childhood to adulthood was never fully accomplished.

Returning to the violence in Gaza and Israel, the voice of conscience is also a call to restraint. Since our acts of conscience, of discerning right from wrong, connects us to the internal voice of God, conscience implies the care for the whole of creation. The care for creation through conscience became apparent in another war, that of the Spanish conquests in South America. Here the superior arms of the Spanish army encountered the powerlessness of the newly discovered peoples of the continent.

The superiority of arms combined with the certainty of Catholic faith produced murderous consequences. To the Bishop Las Casas, a 16<sup>th</sup> century bishop in South America, the only way to resolve this problem was within the Christian faith itself. He contrasted the powerlessness of conscience with the brutality of power without conscience. What justifies the Catholic faith is the awakening of conscience that limits the use of power and protects the powerless.

The bishop's efforts went largely unrecognised at the time, but his analysis of the centrality of conscience within Catholic faith offers the prequel to any solution in the Middle East. Conscience separates the Law of the People from the Law of God. Thus, the Law of the People cannot absorb the Law of God, and act on its' behalf. To the Christian fallible political institutions cannot absorb the Law of God in its entirety. Both Jews and Muslims possess the Law of God, the first the donation of the land, the second world conquest for God. Conscience, as understood by Christians, does not deny the revelation of God but would not seek to impose God's will through political means. Placing the emphasis on the exercise of conscience would at least bring an end to the violence, hard as that would be for both sides. This should be the prayer of every Christian in these weeks.
