Second Sunday of Advent (A)

8th December 2019



Last week saw the tragic and senseless deaths of two Cambridge post-graduates employed in a de-radicalisation programme involving former convicted terrorists. The murder of these two young people by one of the programme's participants has raised the question as to the merit and effectiveness of such conversion programmes. The optimism placed in these courses seem at odds with the commonly attitude that conversion therapy regarding sexuality which are seen as an infringement of conscience.

These de-radicalisation programmes are the secular imitation of the Christian emphasis on conversion, of seeing the errors in one's ways and making a firm purpose of amendment. This leads to embracing a renewed life under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. This religious path of conversion has God, faith and morals both at the beginning and end of the process of conversion. They are in dialogue with each other, though the originating understanding looks inadequate in light of the concluding understanding. There is no sense of changing gods, but of seeing the implications of God's commands as now being more clearly fulfilled. This process of conversion may be seen in that of St Paul, who experienced the same God of Israel as being the One God, but Father, Son and Holy Spirit. St Augustine discovered that the one God for whom he had been searching through philosophy was actually the God speaking through the Bible.

The modern secular mind-set has appropriated the Christian dynamic of conversion but turned it into an ideology of moving a convicted extremist from an erroneous belief in God to some belief in the goodness of humanity and the values of liberal democracy with all its attendant moral certainties. This may seem at first sight a beneficial procedure for the good of secular society but the process touches on the rights of conscience to religious belief. This can only be experienced by the religious person as a secular attempt to stamp out religious faith on mutually incomprehensible terms. The Church has always understood the freedom of religious belief to be an integral part of conscience and right of every individual. This freedom to practise religion does not extend to the creation of civil disorder. The Church rejects violent religious fundamentalism, but that is not the same as rejecting religious faith as such or thinking that all religions lead to violence. The dynamic of conversion requires a spiritual sympathy of sorts, so that only a fellow Christian can invite another Christian through a shared faith to reflect on issues that to a secular minded person would seem completely incomprehensible or the stuff of prejudice. The same is true for Judaism and Islam. Though the thought processes of the violent religious extremist are rightly abhorrent, and more so to a secular minded person, an essential empathy with similar faith is the necessary prequel to any potential conversion.

The season Advent gives central place to conversion. During these four weeks the Church shares the process of conversion prior to the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ Our Saviour. John the Baptist embodies this process and his public ministry precedes that of Jesus Christ's just as his own birth preceded that of Jesus. The Gospel readings narrate events

that took place thirty after the birth of Jesus, and therefore the season of Advent also looks beyond the birth of Jesus towards the adult life of faith and not just the child centred celebration of the Nativity. The focus on the responsibility for conversion might explain why the season of Advent is largely forgotten as it loses its identity in the rush to celebrate the simple childhood certainties of the crib.

However, the strident critique of John the Baptist is the necessary means to grasp our attention to engage in the need for personal change. Nobody wants to be told that their spiritual life has born nogood fruit despite the spiritual advantages with which they have been presented, namely the sacraments, privileged moments of access to God's grace. The call is to think once again of the demands of life entailed by encountering Jesus Christ. They are small scale, almost domestic and local; intergenerational harmony is the description of John's mission according to angel that appears to Zechariah; the just and non-violent means of employment are John the Baptist's request to the tax-collectors and soldiers who come for repentance. The conversion is small scale because this is our contribution that prepares us for the intervention of God inhuman history and not its substitute. The modesty of ambition does not preclude the grandeur of God's gesture of His Son being born in a stable. The conversion in our understanding of God and consequent transformation of our moral compass prepares us for a renewed understanding of God's love and His relationship with us through the birth of His Son in the bare circumstances of the stable in Bethlehem.






To coincide with the 50th anniversary of the parish, this talk will examine the historical reality of St Margaret and her times, and will explore her legacy as queen and saint.
