2nd Sunday of Lent (A)

8th March 2020

Fr Peter writes:

Pope Francis advised the young people at a recent World Youth Day to make sure that they spoke to their grand-parents about their experiences. Two weeks ago, I could share a similar experience as I met, for the first time, my great aunt, 102, who is the youngest sister of my father's father. The family resemblance was there as were the occasional Yorkshire intonations and phrases of my own father. Aunt Doris was the youngest of eight children and listening to her description of their home life was stepping back into history, life in 1920s Tankersley, South Yorkshire. The conversation was littered with the names of obscure relations, their fortunes and their lives, wedding and christening photos. Most it seemed had, like herself, migrated southwards after the Second World War.

The conversation was both an entry into the lost world of one Yorkshire family but also marked the transitory nature of wider family relationships. Every family could tell much the same story of centripetal and centrifugal forces dominating the wider family circle. The experience is that the world pulls people apart through the dynamics of events, work and housing. These impersonal forces are matched by the desire for freedom, of living life elsewhere and creating one's own family home with someone beyond blood ties. Therefore, the life of each of us is the unique amalgam of the desire for roots and the alluring prospects for freedom.

The same dynamic is found in the Christian faith too. The desire for roots is not simply the material conditions of a physical home her on earth, but of seeking a place in the kingdom of heaven, the place of the Resurrection. The desire for freedom is not found in the lack of constraint to go anywhere but found in the desire to follow the path of Jesus towards this home.

This Sunday's Gospel on the Transfiguration describes the moment when these two forces come together. Jesus, standing on a high mountain becomes dazzlingly white in the presence of Peter, James and John. The radiant Jesus is in conversation with Moses and Elijah, discussing His passing (the death on the Cross). During this vision a voice from heaven, repeats the words spoken at

the Baptism in the Jordan: 'This is my Beloved Son, Listen to Him'. The event possesses a sense of danger, but the cloud very quickly disappears. Jesus is found to be standing alone. They leave the mountain and continue their journey to Jerusalem. In a moment the three are alone with Jesus, but they returned confused but changed. The Transfiguration was a foretaste of the Resurrection, a moment of encouragement to the Apostles, but also the event through which the inner identity of Jesus was made known. He truly is the Son of God and on the mountain His divinity visibly shone through His humanity. During His public life Jesus' divinity is only known through an act of faith in His words and actions.

For Jesus to call God Father, and the Father to address Him as 'My beloved Son', points to that intimate connection between the two that includes the Holy Spirit as the love between Father and Son. Later the Church will develop this revelation into the doctrine of the Trinity into which every person is inserted through Baptism. The Baptismal Liturgy reflects something of the Transfiguration when the child or adult is given a white shawl, as he or she now radiates the recently received gift of grace. Like Jesus who descended from the mountain to take up His mission, so the shawl is removed, and life of the individual continues, but differently because the vocation to human life is made a real possibility rather an aspiration. The search for true life and vocation are never just ideas, they are realised in individuals and family, and the same is true for faith as well. The season of Lent is an opportunity to journey once again with Jesus as He walks to Jerusalem.
