een whether it be the

purchase of pumpkins, ghoul outfits and other requisites, such as spiders and spiders' webs. This zombielight festival occupies the imagination of almost every child and is one the by-products of the secular and pagan culture in which we now live. In contrast to the ghouls and phantoms of popular imagination, no funeral is complete now without someone declaring the deceased is in heaven. This was not helped by some priests insisting on wearing white vestments at the funerals of adults, as if the deceased has already passed beyond judgement. The finality of death for the modern Christian has been bypassed while in the streets death's manifestations are all the rage.

Such confusion is the natural outcome of the abandonment of the Christian understanding of the relationship between life and death established by Jesus' own journey through death to the Resurrection. Death is neither the plaything of marketing forces, nor the passing moment of the glibly religious. I recently did a cremation service for a maiden aunt where the mourners came in green clothing to sing Danny Boy at the end of the service. Did this do justice to her regular Mass attendance at the catholic churches of Kensington? I am not sure but the confusion about social conventions surrounding death mirrors the confusion about death itself. Wear something colourful is the Anglican version but why? Death is always a sad occasion, why pretend otherwise?

There is a finality to death, both in bodily years. Time is limited bit there is always the possibility of seeking forgiveness for wrongdoing, for failing to act and bring peace. Jesus died to sin, individual and communal, those known and those unknown too. Recent campaigns such as 'Me Too', 'Everyone is Included' demonstrate to the secular minded that all is not well, and the idea that it is possible to step above and beyond the sins of society needs careful reflection. Unacknowledged sin is a reality for all of us.

The Good News of the Gospel, unlike the harsh judgements of liberal popular opinion, is that conversion and the acceptance of grace can breakdown even the most stubborn human nature. Where there is life there is hope. Jesus Christ rose from the dead, and His victory over sin and death is projected into our lives now. The

life of faith recognises that the victory of Jesus has an impact now, so the life of heaven can be led in anticipation. The Beatitudes, this Sunday's Gospel, the selfportrait of Jesus Christ, are the Resurrection blueprint for the Christian. They are the actions of heaven lived out in anticipation but being in anticipation will always face opposition or indifference.

Herein lies the grounds of judgement for the Christian, not whether they have followed the social mores of the time but how much have they adopted the selfportrait of Jesus Christ. Have we lived, in anticipation, the Beatitudes in our lives. This is a difficult task one that requires grace. Death always comes at a moment when the task remains unfinished. That was why Catholics used to pray against succumbing to an unprovided death without recourse to the sacraments. Christ's actions are powerful beyond the sacraments but the Catholic knows that the sacraments are definitive channels of divine grace. Not being able to administer the last rites to those who had died owing to Covid regulations, or in the case of the MP David Amess is a heavy weight for the practicing catholic, and those they leave behind.

This coming month of November the Church prays for the repose of the souls of the faithful departed, that purified and made whole, they may come to the final judgement and see God face to face. To think any less for such a moment, of not being fully prepared, does not seem right, even when one has removed the all too human aspects of divine judgement preached by the churches beforehand. The Church offers both the sane approach to the finality of death whilst also offering the hope of salvation. All Saints comes before All Souls, because heaven is the ultimate destination even though purgatory is the intermediate stage. Our prayers united to the sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross assist the deceased in their spiritual journey to our hopefully shared destination.
