#### Third Sunday of Advent (A)

#### 15th December 2019

## Fr Peter writes:

By the time this edition of the newsletter is published the results of Thursday's General Election will be known. At the time of writing no-one seems quite sure of the final result. These are the earthly powers, necessary for the ordering of society but cannot by themselves effect the spiritual transformation of society for which Jesus is looking. This must be one of the first general elections in which none of the party leaders professes any religion, even of the weak or non-practising. David Cameron memorably compared his own religious beliefs to that of the radio station Heart FM in the Chilterns, something which tunes in and out. Theresa May was a practising Anglican, Gordon Brown was son of the Manse and Tony Blair flirted with Catholicism whilst Prime Minister. Tim Farron had to resign the Lib Dem leadership over his mainstream Christian views on morality.

The absence of traditional religion with its matrix of rituals, commands and customs does not imply that the religious urge has disappeared. Instead it has morphed into something rather more dangerous; the treating of Brexit or Remain as a dogma of faith and denouncing the opposing views as either verging on fascism or succumbing to the myths of the well-paid urban elites; turning the NHS into a religion, so criticism is seen as heresy, and anything other than a reverential attitude unbecoming; militancy about who can determine sexual identity and the no-platforming of differing views. This is a very religious general election, but not in the ways of past contests.

The Christian find himself or herself in the strange position, almost like the secularists of the 19th century who doubted the scientific claims of religion. Now it is the Christian who has to question the religious fervour in which political discourse is undertaken, and to question the excessive guilt that is laid upon us by environmentalists, social commentators, academics about our habits, our culture, and our prejudices. The exercise brings perspective and proportion both to what politics can achieve, and to the individual's role in the transformation of society. This Sunday's Gospel offers a religious answer to much the same question. St John the Baptist was languishing in Herod's fortress at Machaerus, a lonely outpost in the Judaean desert on the east bank of the river Jordan, a long way from Jerusalem. John had heard of Jesus' miracles but must have been perplexed because since the societal changes that he was expecting were not happening. Everything must have seemed so small scale compared to the large crowds coming for the baptism of repentance.

However, John's messengers are reassured. Something is happening and though the actions are small-scale, God's kingdom is breaking into the world. The small scale of the healings is not just a foretaste of something to happen in the future but the beginning of something completely new, the inbreaking of God's

kingdom into the world. This distinction between the multitude coming for conversion and the small-scale quality of Jesus' intervention points to the longer process that is conversion, of composed both of the negative and the positive. God's grace is the positive and is not destined for the privileged few alone but the positive gift of grace does require a response. The gift, therefore, is always personal, and so spiritual

healing is always small scale. Public life, on the other hand, has become very good at the first, about what is wrong in society and what needs change, all added with the sulphur of entitlement and greed. It is lamentably poor at providing the positive since the demise of religion in the public realm as may be seen in the instant criticism about failing to mention alternative lifestyles when a politician or public figure defends the family.

Elsewhere in the Gospels the Church is described as the yeast that leavens the flour of the community. The numbers involved in any Christian community are therefore immaterial to its mission. Now as Western Europe enters more deeply into a post-Christian age for the present, the role of the Church as a witness in darkening times will be ever more vital. The Good News is that the light of the Church is provided by none other than her believers who shine not with their light but with the light of Jesus Christ. The origin of this light is from beyond the world and the Christian participates in this light. This is the light shining in the darkness of St John's Prologue, the light of the crib. The light is immediately attractive and has the power to overtake us, and make us its own. Here lies our true happiness and peace.


