3rd Sunday of Lent (A)

15th March 2020

Fr Peter writes:

Everyone has a story to tell. Most stories never get an airing, the details forever locked in the silence of mute memory. The attempts to recapture the voices of the First World war has now concluded. The voices of the Holocaust and the mid -century drama of fascism and communism are quickly going silent, age is catching up with that remarkable generation of survivors from the camps. The richness of current historical understanding of the nation's past and the plethora of newly published history books testifies to our obsession with history. The school history lessons of the past might have fixated on kings and queens, battles and conquests but today there is a broader understanding of history that is the combination of both big picture drama and countless individual and collective stories.

The power of any story, real and fictional, lies in its ability to communicate the truth and inspire us to action. This truth is not something abstract, a theorem of science or abstract moral norm but as something individual and lived. The actions, struggles, temptations, failures and decisions of any individual are examples on which to reflect, to recoil or be inspired depending. There is a dynamism in the retelling of personal stories, the sense of a thin current of hope that despite whatever had happened in the past, will triumph in the end. This hope may be imbodied in the person involved in the drama, or in those listening to the story-teller face to face, or the reader through the text of the novel or history book.

Every story teller whether real or fictional requires a listener and the better the listener the more profound the story becomes. The polite couplet, 'how are you', I'm fine thank you' does not penetrate the depths of our soul. This dialogue might suffice for a brief encounter in the street or place of work but often time something deeper is required from both the narrator and the listener. The need that every storyteller possesses for a listener indicates how tough it must be for someone who has no-one to listen to them.

Jesus demonstrates throughout the Gospels that He is both the imaginative preacher and sympathetic listener. Both are vital tools for the mission of the Church today. The communication of the faith in this Sunday's Gospel finds fertile ground only after Jesus had initiated a dialogue with the woman at the well. This began with their common need for water, and Jesus moves the dialogue onto questions about



living water. Interspersed with their erudite conversation on Jews and Samaritans Jesus both lets her speak her story and prophetically identifies salient facts about her life. Though Jesus only gave one fact, the Samaritan woman later told the townspeople that He had told her everything. The woman at Jacob's Well received more than she anticipated when she headed to the well in the midday sun.

There is much more to this Gospel than simply the dynamics of faith conversations between narrator and listener but the content of faith finds no better way than this to communicate its saving power. The Church possesses a coherent faith built on the foundation stone of Jesus: His birth, life death Resurrection and Ascension, and the sending of the Holy Spirit. The first task of catechetics, the systematic explanation of the faith, is to find the entry point in someone's life story. The entry point is deeper than just family background; maybe it is an unexplained experience of God, the meeting with a holy person, some misfortune or tragedy. To take hold faith requires this intimate and personal connection and so faith becomes, in such situations, much more self-validating. Faith makes sense even if it cannot be put in words.

The sharing of our life-stories, whether in the role of story-teller or listener might be a fruitful way to occupy the evenings when we are indoors reticent about going out when the Corona virus is in full swing. Maybe the rediscovery of the art of listening and narrating might led to rediscovering the sparks of faith that already exist within us but have been smothered by layers of transitory noise and business of life. As one Bishop working in the Vatican, remarking about his adopted country, suddenly everyone is talking about life, about preserving it and finding strategies to maintain life, rather than death. All this talking of life is a wonderful prelude, in his opinion, for talking about faith too.

LONDON BOROUGH OF RICHMOND UPON THAMES


