2nd SUNDAY OF ADVENT – 4th DECEMBER 2022 - Year A

In Peter writes:

Last week the Office of National Statistics issued their latest survey of religious affiliation in England with information culled from the 2021 National Census. Much glee has been expressed by secularists that only 43 per cent of the population would choose a religious affiliation. Personally, I am surprised that the figure is not lower. Religious affiliation comes in different forms from full commitment, intermittent attendance at a place of worship and to fraying cultural ties through family of origin.

Saying Mass at St Richard Reynolds on a regular basis and seeing the disappearance of families with teenage children from the Parish makes me think that the situation is not going to get better any time soon. Strangely I am not depressed about this. Much of the traditional structures of the Church will disappear; regular weekday Masses; multiple Masses on Sunday; the availability of priests to celebrate funerals for the lapsed; saying Mass at catholic schools; second collections for redundant organisations. These cultural practices have endured long after their meaning has disappeared. The large number of vocations in the 1960s is now fully unwound, through death and retirement. The blip of Anglican converts from the 1990s is now reaching retirement. There will be far fewer priests about in the future.

Two reasons make me hopeful for the future. Firstly, the lack of religious practice has not made this country an easier place to govern. Indeed, the opposite is the case. Once the role of conscience has been excluded from public life, the corruption in central government, the unaccountability of local government, the lack of responsibility in the running of utility and transport companies, the greed of bitcoin financial institutions, the bullying culture of trade unions. The list is endless. If this is the consequence of a non-religious society then perhaps the collapse of faith, of accountability to a higher power for one's actions might be something to rue, rather than celebrate. Faith has something to offer the public square. Responsibility and conscience, of taking care of everything by taking care for what one is responsible, at home, at work, in society. These matched with compassion and forgiveness are the Christian tools for shared existence without which social fragmentation and mutual antagonism are the consequences.

Secondly Jesus Christ brought a healing balm to the pains of the world of His time, both to those he encountered during His public ministry and universally through His death and Resurrection. The Church can communicate the same healing balm too. Jesus' offer followed the cry of the suffering for healing. They knew their need

for healing and for grace. Where such knowledge is missing or has been misappropriated the healing balm cannot be given. Misappropriation describes our secular culture living as it does in the shadow of its Christian heritage.

Thus, Christmas has been appropriated but without the season of waiting, Advent. The shallowness of secular culture is only emphasised by the spurious bonhomie of the season, of social events preceding the Festival itself, of endless Christmas songs on the radio. Any sane person would be tired of the season by the time Boxing Day arrives, when to the Church this is only the second of twelve days of Christmas. Preparation gives way to joyful celebration.

Jesus Christ did not preach an arcane or secret message that requires a password to enter, and neither does the Church. There is no double check to begin a relationship with Jesus or the Church. He comes to us as does the Church in simplicity and that is the problem. The contemporary world finds it difficult to engage with the obvious whether it be sadness or joy. To the contemporary mind there must be some catch, an undiscovered cause, a concealed pattern of power. Deflecting the causes of sadness away from sin, whether personal or cumulative within any society, makes the proposed cure of grace marginal. Answers to the modern non-religious person is always therapy but such processes can only go so far. The healing comes from beyond mere human processes, however well intentioned. Paradoxically this desire for healing is the time-honoured entry into faith. If human processes cannot heal who can? Time to think of spiritual healing not just psychological.

Recognising this spiritual healing and the hope that it brings into the world defines the Advent season. This Sunday's Gospel is the account of John the Baptist's call to conversion, of recognising within ourselves what only the coming Saviour can achieve. Out of this healing relationship is built both the Church, and our shared lives; family, community and society.
