2nd Sunday of Advent - 6th December 2020 Year B



Christmas decorations have arrived early this year here in St Margarets Road, by at least two or three weeks. All very understandable after this year of Covid-induced restrictions that have cut to the heart of national life. I wonder, though, if the preparations will return back to their normal start date next year, hungry as we all seem to be to celebrate everything in anticipation. Even the University is in on the act of pre-celebration, and so I must admit to installing the crib in front of the Chaplaincy already!

As a contrast the Church proposes something different this Sunday, a stark contrast to the well-known Christmas account, the opening verses of St Marks' Gospel. This account does not begin with the birth of Jesus or brief account of His parentage. Instead it starts mid-stream, at a different beginning, that of the mission of John the Baptist when Jesus was already thirty years old. I would like to propose that this beginning complements what every Christian knows from tradition, the story of the birth of Jesus. This beginning has the capacity to start at any time in life, and therefore becomes the answer to those who think Christmas is for children only. This is our 'adult' reading through which we may reflect on what joys the coming of Jesus will bring to our lives this year. To begin one has to clear out all the junk, a spiritual decluttering.

John the Baptist raises the question about our conduct, about the meaning of my own life, and where to rediscover this purpose once again. The repentance demanded by John the Baptist obviously refers to wrongdoing but also to the many grey areas of life, too many drinks, obsessive checking of mobile phones, binging on Netflix, and aimless surfing of the internet nurturing your favourite conspiracy theory. What was once an enjoyable relaxation has somehow become obsessive. The Baptist is barging into our world, into its most unprepossessing parts, that spiritual wilderness of mediocrity in which we have found ourselves wandering these last months.

Much has been spoken about the mental issues stemming from lockdown but what has become obvious is how Covid has only accelerated the process of secularisation that has gripped this country over the last twenty years. Older people can speak about these months of lockdown through the medium of a quiet

religiosity, of Sunday school, RE classes and intermittent attendance at Church. This natural light, of vague knowledge of God, part of the traditional virtue of justice, has been taken away from young people. They grow up in a culture where religion is a folk memory derived from the practice of a long distant generation. The hope that previous generations possessed through their faith has been taken from them, and with that the power to effect change in themselves and our society. Belief in God is the true foundation for justice and for mutual respect because only because God's existence raises questions about equality between peoples: we are all God's children. Being equal entails mutual responsibility. John the Baptist is calling us to take back responsibility.

Taking responsibility for each other implies that life is shared, a joint enterprise, not always easy, sometimes difficult and lonely. John the Baptist's command to repent is the invitation to reflect once again how we embrace our family responsibilities, our care for ourselves, our care for each other, and be extension the common home we share with each other. His preaching raises questions but also prepares us for someone who will supplement our newly discovered weakness and fill that weakness with His grace.

The mission of John the Baptist helps through our self-examination to glimpse at the power of the one who is to come, Jesus Christ. He came once in history. He will come again at the end of time, but is arriving now continually whenever we answer the preaching of John the Baptist and begin the road of conversion. Then Jesus breaks into our lives, the ever present breaking-in, that is the consequence of Him coming into the world, and being born in a stable in Bethlehem. The joy of Christmas is not just once a year, but potentially available every day.
